RARE MEN.

"For I have no man likeminded, who will naturally care for your state, for all seek their own, not the things which are Jesus Christ's."—Phs. 2-20-21.

We might use the caption Rare Young Men had not Paul said "I have no man likeminded," so a more appropriate title is as above, viz., "Rare Men." There are men who stand out conspicuously in every calling of life, because of particularly brilliant gifts, or attainments, and we are attracted by the ease and grace with which they perform their duties, but in the above passages from Paul's letter to the Phillipians we have a rare type of a preacher of the gospel, possessing a quality that attracted the attention of the great apostle and caused him to set a special value upon it, and placed Timothy in a class by himself, a man whose absorbing care was the state of the people to whom he ministered, so completely was he filled with this love that Paul said: "Who will naturally care for your state."

Hidden in this declaration of the apostle is a jewel rare for all ministers of the gospel young and old and for evangelists and all Christian workers who can get salvation so complete that they will seek the things of Jesus Christ and not their own, but Paul under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit declared that the great majority seek their own and not the things of Jesus Christ. What awful things the records of the great day will reveal on this subject. What awful hypocrisy of men going about the country with an outside mask or pretense of love and deep sacrificing concern for the spiritual welfare of the people, when the facts known to the great divine recorder are that he had selfish ends in some form in view. How we need the searching light of the Holy Spirit turned powerfully upon our hearts to reveal to us constantly our true motives while working among the people. Preaching for a living and not caring whether men are saved or not is an awful crime before God.

Beloved, which class are we in. With Timothy absorbed in the spiri-

tual need of the people or absorbed in looking after our own earthly need with the great majority? Men are rare who possess the quality which distinguished this young man of God.
