CORRESPONDENCE.

PAULPIETERSBURG, Natal, South Africa, June 15th, 1906.

Dear Highway,—We wish to goin with others in adding our congratulations to your editor and wife, at the recent anniversary of their marriage, and pray they may be spared, if it can be our Father's will, to celebrate their 50th anniversary and that the coming years, may as the past be full of good works for the master, winning many precious souls from sin, and leading others into the blessed experience of full salvation.

Bro. and Sister Sanders and family left us yesterday for a five days stay among the people at the Pongola. They will have the opportunities, they have long wished for, of preaching to the hundreds who do not come here.

We are praying that as the result of this work many trophies may be won for Jesus. We are glad to be able to make it possible for them to go, and fill the place here, as best we can. We are managing nicely to understand the people and they us, though it is most a puzzle sometimes. One woman came this morning to have a tooth extracted. After I performed this for her, and applied medicine in the cavity, which they always want, she went on her way rejoicing. A man came for medicine which was given him, this pleased him greatly. The wants are numerous, some say they come to beg, they will want a piece of cloth, thread or a needle to patch their blankets etc. while some want a sweet potato. Every piece of cotton or wool cloth is readily disposed of in this way, so nothing is thrown away.

Many of our friends wish to know something of the native rebellion in this Colony. No doubt others get reports through the home papers, and know that Bambata one of the chiefs, has been hiding in the thorne forest for some time with many followers, and causing much trouble. The last telegraphic report says "a big fight took place in the bush Sunday June 10th, which began at day break and lasted until dusk. The estimated losses of the enemy, at least 350. Bambata escaped though his horse was shot, and reports say he is wounded, his bandolier and pistol which he dropped were taken. Five horses shot and two taken. The enemy appears to be absolutely demoralised. One European killed and several seriously wounded." Amid all those troublesome times, our Father has verified his promise through us, and kept us in perfect peace. We know the dear ones in the home land are holding us up in the arms of faith in prayer, and that the everlasting arms are around us. Our work has not been hindered in the least by this disturbance, and the natives around here are very quiet. But we hope this trouble may end very soon. Others have fled to the towns and cities for protection but we have stayed at our post, believing this to be our duty, and as we have trusted our Father in the past, we still trust Him to carry us through safely. We are having ideal weather, scarcely any frost, no rains and during the day it is much like summer weather at home.

We praise the Lord for his great goodness to us and for the privilege of working for him in this dark land.

HARTLAND, N. B., July 28th, 1906.

Dear Highway,—Perhaps a word from us would be in order at this time. After leaving Beulah we went back to Grand Manan and spent a few days in getting our things ready to move. On Sunday 15th inst. we had the privilege of meeting again with the churches and preached to them the word, the Lord wonderfully blessing us all. On the 18th inst. we took our leave from them, but we shall always be indebted to the friends on the Island, for their kindness to us while we were laboring among them, and shall never forget the love and friendship which existed between pastor and people. We left the boat at St. Stephen and after shipping our goods we started with the team across the country for a three days drive coming via: Lawrence and Harvey Station and then to the St. John River. Here we had the pleasure of meeting some of the friends, and former co workers, at Southampton, Greenbush and Meductic. Leaving the last named place on Saturday morning we arrived here in

the afternoon a little tired after driving in the heat so far, but we enjoyed the drive very much as the country is very beautiful through which we passed. We are very busy these days getting things settled in the home and also attending to the duties of the pastor as well. On the afternoon of 27th inst., about fifty of the friends here gathered at our home to welcome us to their midst, among whom were two old saints of God, Sisters Boyer and Miller, aged respectively 88 and 85 years. We were much pleased to meet these sisters again as also so many of our old friends and also to meet some for the first time. The sisters having brought their baskets along well filled with good things, soon began to spread the tables on the lawn and soon all present were invited to sit down to an enjoyable meal. After supper the praying band having brought their small organ along with them started to praise God in song which was joined in by all present. We have hardly yet got started in the work here but wish to say that we are glad to find so strong a band of workers in the churches. Personally we are enjoying salvation full and free.

PAULPIETERSBURG, Natal, South Africa, June 4th, 1906.

Dear Highway,—No doubt a description of a christian burial in this dark land would be of interest to you. Maria, one of our christian women last Friday, lost one of her twin babies, which was about two months old. She accidentally lay upon it while sleeping at night and killed it. So a man was sent to Dr. Sanders to find out our laws of burial. A cloth was provided by Sister Sanders to wrap the remains in; instructions were given and the native returned home to dig the grave and make preparations for the funeral. On Saturday morning Dr. Sanders and the writer went up to preach to the people and perform the christian rites. The little grave had been dug in the centre of the kraal and they had killed a goat and were dressing it when we arrived there. Upon inquiry we found it is a native custom to always kill an animal of some kind on the occasion of a death. Some pots were made ready and in one was placed the quarters of the goat, together with the head and hoofs, to cook. The contents of the stomach was then emptied but they did not seem to think it necessary to wash them, the digested food that remained, we suppose, was to answer the place of spice. The stomach was cut up and with the liver, heart and lungs put into another pot. The head man, grandfather of the deceased, then asked the Dr. what was to be done with the rest of the meat. He seemed to have an idea that the christians disposed with it in a different way from the natives. A native christian present informed him that the cooking and eating of meat has nothing to do with a christian burial. So the intestines were cut up and with some fat divided among the women. They did not take the trouble to empty the contents but placed them near the fire to roast. The head man then asked the Dr. what was to be done with the gall and was told he could throw it away or do as he wished. We learn that at heathen weddings an animal is killed and the gall is taken care of and some weeks after they return and burn it; thus it plays an important part in the ceremony. We suppose, according to heathen customs, it must have some place in their burial ceremony also. The people being then gathered we went on with the service. After singing and prayer the Dr. spoke a few moments. The writer then followed with a few words after which each christian present, including the mother of deceased, testified or exhorted the people. The little one was then wrapped in a native mat made of grass and placed in the grave after a few rags had been thrown in the bottom. A goat skin on top completed the covering. The tin box the baby drank from was then placed in the grave and after the usual christian burial service had been read and benediction pronounced the grave was filled up. The Dr. afterwards explained to them that the child would have no futher use for drinking cups. This is the first christian burial in this place so we can't wonder that the people are not entirely free from heathen notions.

The outlook for the success of the work

is continuing to brighten. A young man and boy were baptized yesterday and they, with a girl who was baptized before, were taken into the church. Thirty-five were present at the services and fourteen partook of the Lord's supper.

Swart Boy, the father of u Martha, whose kraal is in sight of our house, was here to church for the first time since we arrived, and said he desired greatly to believe. We ask you to unite with us in prayer that real conviction may take hold of the people and that many may "be turned from darkness to light and from the power of satan unto God." We are having victory in our souls. The precious blood cleanseth from all sin and the Holy Spirit adides.
