OUR ATTITUDE TOWARD UNION.

At the present writing we feel this will be our final article under this heading.

Now, it may be that some of my readers may have an impression that we as a body of Christians are not, at the present time, very susceptible to the question of organic union. Really, we believe in and preach and teach and endeavor to enforce it by our example the principle of true Christian union: viz., the spiritual oneness and fellowship of all true believers. This is the highest and most sacred of all, "the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace." This is far beyond and above all church or organic unions. The latter may be based on certain religious and social and financial considerations, but the spiritual oneness of all believers in Jesus is like John's baptism, it is from heaven, and not of men.

Now, speaking for ourselves, as Reformed Baptists, having been brought out and brought in and raised up for a distinct mission in this country, the spreading of scriptural holiness all over these lands, we sincerely believe that our work on these lines is not yet fully accomplished. We have not as yet gotten under full steam. We have been in the past largely occupied in digging through mountains of prejudice and raising up the valleys of discouragement and bridging the rivers of opposition and erecting outposts, and sending out advance guards all over the country to advertise that we're coming, bringing in great trainloads of full salvation gospel to scatter all over the land.

Why, sir, Beulah and Riverside are the only forts we have got as yet. We must have another soon in Nova Scotia at some central place, and still

another, in the years to come, at some convenient place in the great Northwest.

Say, brother, did you think that the blessed truths of full salvation and entire sanctification were only for the Maritime provinces. No sir. It is too big a gospel for any denomination or nation to monopolize. It is world-wide in its scope, and in its divining healing, cleansing, purging and purifying efficacy is unchangeable and everlasting. The truth of sanctification goes on. It has in it the element and power of eternal progression. Great ecclesiastical assemblies have attempted in the past to legislate it away from the hearts of the people and consign it to the realm of forgetfulness, but you see it is not moved by any mandate of conference or assembly. It is here, and here to stay. And today, by the grace of God and the consecration and faithfulness of God's ambassadors, it is knocking hard and loudly at the gate of every evangelical church.

We repeat that our mission throughout this entire country is not yet done. God has not as yet asked us to hand over our divine credentials. And so long as we as a people hold true to our mission and do not backslide from the scriptural idea of holiness, I verily believe that God wants us to keep our credentials, advertise our work and mission and hew away along the line of entire sanctification. So, my brother, not until we backslide from the Bible idea of holiness and become tame and commonplace in our teaching and work, and God withdraws his seal from our ministry,—not until then need we open our minds to unite with any church organization which would relegate the doctrine and experience of sanctification to a secondary place in their thought.

So, the conclusion is, that while we hold ourselves free to unite with others in the definite advocacy of the blessed truth of sanctification, we may have to wait many years yet before any denomination in this country will come up to the place where they will put this doctrine and experience of holiness where we have put it, viz., in the fore front of all our work. Like the great naval commander, Nelson, we have nailed our flag to the mast. We cannot haul it down. It is there to stay. With every Reformed Baptist that is worthy of the name, it is victory along these lines, or going back it is death and stagnation and final disgrace and discomfiture. Union! Yes, every time for God's glory, but union, never, for the praise of men. And so, until further notice from the seat of heaven, we will pursue, with every power of our redeemed being, the mission and glorious work to which our blessed Lord has called us. Amen.

The past year's work of blessed fruitful ministry, in many parts of our home field, as well as abroad, is the most convincing argument to any hesitating soul, that God emphatically puts his seal upon all our labors. To these things let us ever hold.
