> In answer to many enquiries the statement was published, presumably with the authority of the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, that Sunday School periodicals published outside of Canada could not lawfully be distributed in Sunday school in Canada on the Lord's day after the new Lord's Day Aet comes into force on the 1st of March next. This was based on the assumption that these periodicals are "classified as newspapers" by the Pos-

It appears, however, upon mature consideration, that the ordinary Sunday School publications including Leaflets, Children or Young People's papers, Lesson Helps, Monthlies, Quarterlies and such like, will not be in any way affected by the new Act, and Sunday School pupils and teachers on the Lord's Day, notwithstanding Section 9 of the Act respecting the Lord's Day.
