NOTICE TO OUR SUBSCRIBERS IN THE UNITED STATES.

THE KING'S HIGHWAY has nearly three hundred subscribers and exchanges in the "United States," for which the "new Canadian Postal Law" imposes an additional postage of about \$70.00 per year. We do not know what action the Alliance will take regarding this matter, but we will send a statement to all of our subscribers in the United States who are in the arrears, hoping that all will pay up and renew before the Alliance Meets.

BAPTIST UNION.

Under the above caption the Carleton Sentinel of last week contained an editorial suggesting the appointment of committees by the United Baptists and the Reformed Baptists to consider a basis of union of the two bodies, and with this in view several persons were interviewed on the subject. By inquiring into the origin of this proposition we find that two unauthorized persons, one a United Baptist and the other a Reformed Baptist had interviewed Mr. Thorne, the editor of the Sentinel, and suggested the subject to him. It seems to us that these brethren took a good deal upon themselves without consulting others about so important a matter. The writer is in the position to state as chairman of the executive committee of the Reformed Baptist Alliance, which committee represents the Alliance relating to all business that needs attention between the annual meetings of the Alliance, that no person has been given in any way authority to represent the Reformed Baptists in starting a question of union with any other denomination. We do not want to mislead the United Baptist people to think we are as a body seeking union, for we are not. Neither do we expect to surrender a single point on which we differ; nor do we ever expect to surrender the freedom that we now enjoy. We sincerely regret this agitation, and hope it will end right here.

BEULAH CAMP MEETING.



On account of not being able to get Dr. Carradine until July 8-17, and also the backwardness of spring, The Alliance Executive have decided it advisable to postpone the meeting of the Alliance from June 26th to July 3rd. So now the dates of the Alliance and Camp Meeting at Beulah Camp Ground will be July 3-17. DEATH OF MRS. H. S. KINNEY.

Monday Morning, May 6--In Poor Health Eight Years.

Phebe Walton, wife of Henry S. Kinney of Fort Fairfield, died at 9.00 o'clock Monday morning, aged nearly 63 years. She had been in poor health eight years.

The funeral was held at the Congregational church, of which the deceased was an exemplary member, Wednesday at 10.00 o'clock, Rev. P. J. Trafton, pastor of the Reformed Baptist church, officiating. The pall was borne by F. W. Burns, H. N. Goodhue, L. S. Osgood, L. K. Cary, B. A. Churchill and C. H. Dinsmore. Interment was made in Riverside Cemetery.

The deceased was born near Woodstock, N. B., and married Mr. Kinney nearly 40 years ago. With her husband and family she came to Fort Fairfield in 1885, and ever since made her home on the Houghton-Merritt farm, north side Aroostook river, near Fort Fairfield village.

Mrs. Kinney is survived by her husband and six children—William DeArey, physician, Osterville, Mass.; Effie Bernice, now Mrs. Guy D. Meldrim, Houlton; George W., Leonard S., and Harry E., farmers, Fort Fairfield, and Roy, student in Bowdoin College. Mr. and Mrs. Kinney had also lost two children many years ago.

The deceased was of a remarkably pleasant and genial disposition, diffusing cheerfulness and happiness to all around. She was a kind neighbor and friend, a thrifty, hard-working, model housewife, a faithful helpmate, and a most devoted and affectionate mother, one whose children rise up to call her blessed. Long a devoted Christian, death had for her no terrors; and she set out across the dark river confident that she should see her Pilot face to face when she had crossed the bar.—Fort Fairfield Review.
