BEULAH CAMP MEETING.

While it is conducted by the Reformed Baptists it is not for denominational ends, but the purposes in view are as broad as the glorious gospel of Christ, which is free to all the world, whether the people believe us or not. God knows it to be true! as stated above the Salvation of the sinner and the entire sanctification of believers irrespective of denominational connections, "is the grand object in view." Mr. Grumbler and Mr. Small Mind have much to say about the finances of the Camp Meeting. But men of sense and experience know that it costs a lot of money to conduct meetings of this kind and to establish, improve, and keep up the grounds, beside the traveling expences and support of Evangelists, especially of such an excellent class of men as have visited Beulah, which have been selected from the ablest and best men on this continent. None of the evangelists have been Baptists, but mostly of Methodist connection, but definite and clear in the Wesleyan doctrines of the two works of grace. The work in connection with the Camp Meeting is done gratuitously, the only persons who are paid are the cook and helpers in the kitchen, every dollar received is expended for running expences and in connection with the grounds. The only money raised for denominational work is the Missionary offering, and every man should be willing to contribute to this fund. We make this statement to help people understand the grand object of Beulah Camp Meeting, which is equally true of Riverside Camp Meeting. Dr. Carradine the evangelist for this season is a member in good standing of the Methodist Church South. He is the author of about twenty-five books, and is a regular contributor to the Christian Witness. This is his third visit to Beulah; thousands of

New Brunswick people have heard him in the past, and many of his books are to be found all over the provinces of N. B. and Nova Scotia.

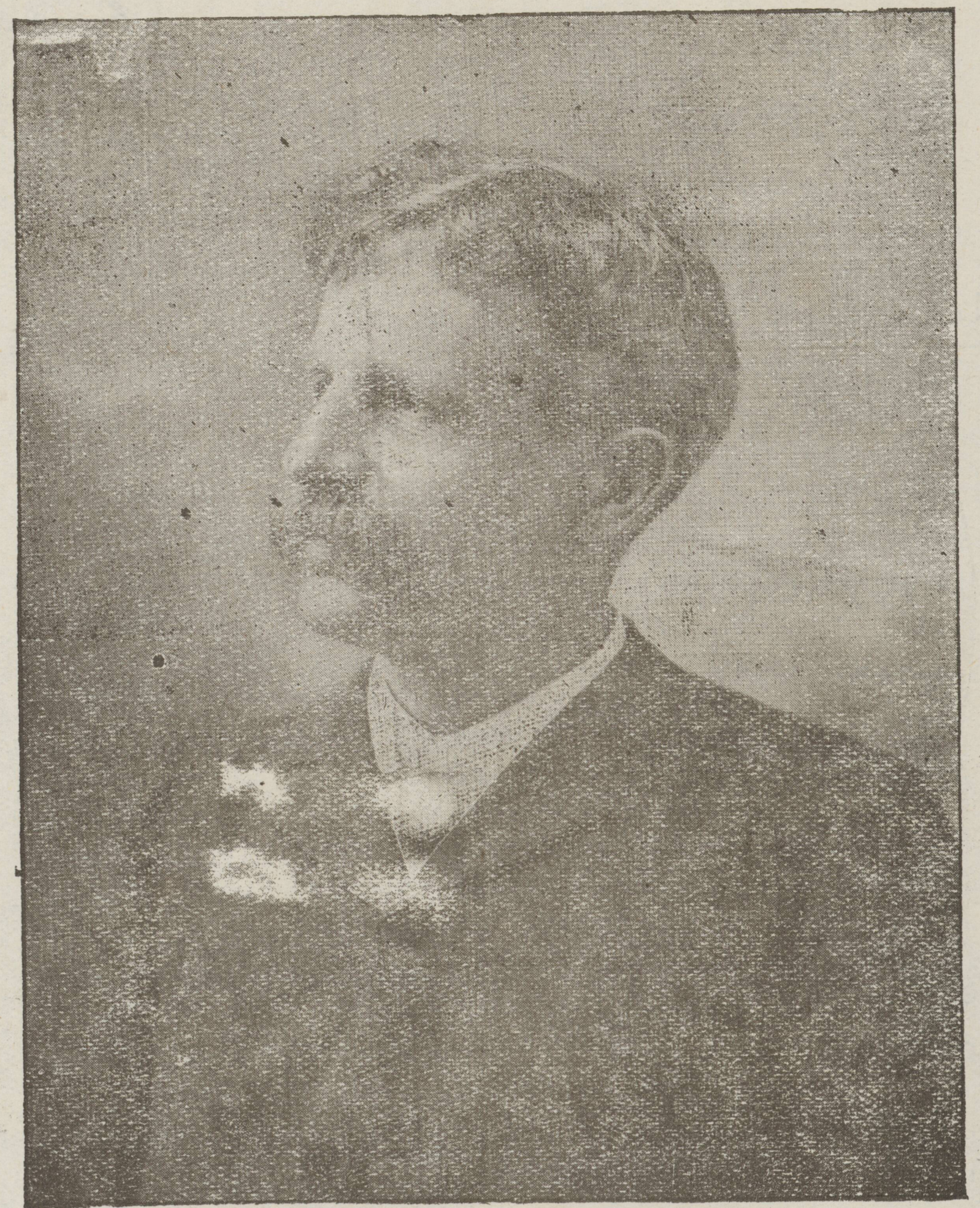

QUARTERLY MEETING.

The Reformed Baptist Quarterly Meeting of District No. 2 convened with the church at Upper Springfield on Tuesday June 4th. The attendance was good throughout the convention. This church was organized only last winter and is strongly opposed by those who choose a sinning religion. Nevertheless many, who did not understand, being led, perhaps by curiosity more than by hunger and thirst for righteousness, to the quarterly meetings, were convinced, by the interesting explanation of the doctrine given by Rev. M. S. Trafton, that Holiness is the blessed possession of every one that believes God and His word.

The business meeting was called to order on Friday afternoon. Officers for the new quarter were elected as follows: Rev. F. H. Grass, president; Ira DeWitt Long, secretary; Mrs. William Beals, treasurer; H. W. McCutcheon, HIGHWAY Agent.

It was moved and adopted that every church in the district appoint a HIGHWAY Agent to assist the district Agent in securing subscriptions for the paper of the denomination.

To the roll call of ministers four responded. They were: Revs. Z. B. Grass, F. H. Grass, M. S. Trafton and A. F. Tanner.

To the roll call of delegates the following responded:—Bro. D. Hayes from Mercer Settlement, also Mrs. P. Hayes and Mrs. F. H. Grass as substitutes; H. W. McCutcheon and H. Kierstead from Upper Springfield; Mrs. A. Hayes and Mr. A. Taylor from Head of Millstream.

Four churches reported by letter. The letter from the church at Upper Springfield was full and highly expressive of a burning zeal for God and the cause of Holiness, not only in their own, but in all churches everywhere, where full salvation is preached. No new members have been added since the last quarterly meeting, and two have removed from the community. The present membership is thirteen.

Mercer Settlement church reports victory all the time through the cleansing blood of Jesus. No new members added. The Sunday school is a very important branch of the work here. The attendance is good, as well as the interest in the study of God's word.

No letter from Head of Millstream church. The pastor, Rev. F. H. Grass reported that the interest in God's work is deepening. Although the church there was organized within the last year, full salvation has been preached for many years. And people realize that Holiness is God's remedy for sin. God is surely blessing the little band there.

Moncton—The letter from this church

reports about the same as last quarterly meeting. They are sharing the blessings of God, but still looking to Him for more. The interest is fairly good, but they would see it better. Since the last quarterly meeting they were blessed by a visit from Rev. W. B. Wiggins and wife.

St. John—No letter from this church. The pastor, Rev. M. S. Trafton was pleased to report a steady, ever-increasing zeal for God and His cause, among the members of his church. The Sunday school is doing good work. The interest in missionary work among the members of this church is greater than any other in the district according to the report. The pastor is looking for \$500 in the coming year, for that branch alone of the work.

Amherst—This church, although scattered till only two or three remain, reports faith in God for the fulfilment of his every promise. Since the last quarterly meeting they have been visited by Bro Wiggins and wife, and Rev. M. S. Trafton.

Lutz Mountain.—No letter from this church. Rev. Z. B. Grass, their pastor reported the standing of the church about the same as at the last quarterly meeting. The interest is low. A few are trusting God for final victory over the adversary. May God send aid to these weak churches.

Westchester—No letter. Rev. M. S.
