THE OTHER SIDE.

To the editor of the Sentinel,—

Dear Editor:

I have noticed in some late issues of your paper some articles with headings Baptist Union, and as they seem to be all on one side of the question, I thought you might like to hear something on the other side.

There are some things in your last article I think quite misleading such as scores on both sides being in favour of such union. I do not think that many of the Reformed Baptist denomination would listen to any such proposal.

I am led to wonder why the United Baptists would wish us to unite with them again on the same conditions existing for which they disfellowshipped and threw us out twenty years ago for preaching and testifying to the doctrine and experience of entire and instantaneous sanctification as a definite second work as strongly taught in the new testament in different terms such as sanctify you wholly, holiness, purity of heart, perfect love, baptism of the Holy Ghost, in short how could a Holy Bible teach anything short of holiness?

On the other hand I do not see why Reformed Baptists should wish to unite with the same people again.

I belonged to a church, the pastor of which at that time, told me he did not know how any of us pretended to get holiness out of the almanac. But I would not compare him with all Baptists, having nothing to say against them. I love and respect all Christians but such union I look upon as impossible under existing circumstances.

There is much more I would like to say and may farther on.

The above was written by Brother Burpee for the Carleton Sentinel, from which we copy it. The editor makes the following statements in which he says Mr. Burpee was ill advised in submitting it. The Highway thinks the agitation brought forth in the Sentinel, whether it originated with a Reformed Baptist or a United Baptist, was ill-advised. It is not a question of old sores or any ill feeling between the two denominations, but a difference on a vital point of faith and christian experience in which neither denomination has changed. To an outsider the United Baptists seem to have laid aside their old prejudices and the Reformed Baptists to have modified their profession of entire sanctification and their methods of work; but this is not the fact. The Reformed Baptists believe as firmly today as ever, and more so, in entire, instantaneous sanctification as a definite second work of grace, and they preach and urge upon the people to seek this great gift of the Holy Spirit as earnestly as at any time in their history, and for them to enter organic union with a people who openly declare they do not believe it, would be the most unwise thing possible. This does not show that we harbour unkind feelings toward those who differ from us because we take this position, for we do not.

NOTE—The above letter was brought to the Sentinel by Rev. S. A. Baker, and published at his request. We are glad to print it in one way, and sorry in another. We regret the tone of the communication and feel that Mr. Burpee was ill-advised in submitting it. No doubt many others will think that way too. Mr. Burpee says we printed a misleading article. The only thing he challenges is our statement that "Scores on each side are in favor of Union." If he had read carefully he would have seen that from one church alone half a dozen prominent R. B. laymen expressed entire sympathy with the project, while two members of the R. B. Executive have done the same thing. Two prominent R. B. clergymen have come out in favor. Surely Mr. Burpee was writing without due consideration on that point. At any rate he should present some evidence along with any future challenge of the nature. The Sentinel has no axe to grind. We were asked by prominent Reformed Baptists to open our columns on the matter, and did so. Personally we do not care whether the two bodies ever unite. Mr. Burpee or any other gentleman may freely continue the discussion, always avoiding, of

course, personalities, old sores, etc. The merits of the case from the present, not past, should be discussed. The doctrine of forgive and forget should receive some attention.—Carleton Sentinel.
