It seems this child of eight years is already betrothed to a heathen, and this man is not willing for her to believe, lest she should have a Christian young man and want to marry him. Though to be sure, the girls have very little to say about such matters.

I had the pleasure of giving a dress to an old woman, a few days ago, this was her first, she could scarcely express her thanks. Yesterday she came to me after the morning service and said come out here I want to show you something. She took me out by the pile of wood where she showed me a black hen tied and said, "this is for you to thank you for the nice dress you gave me, now I have something to wear to meeting." Of course I had to accept this with thanks. The dear soul she appreciated so much the dress. I most wished I had given her two or three.
