BRING IN THE TITHES.

"Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it," Mal. 3-10.

The Lord wants all the tithes, in the unfavorable seasons, as well as in the favorable seasons. In the fruitful season some may withhold part of the tithes because it amounts to so much, and in the poor season they again withhold because their share is smaller than usual. Those who would have and retain the Lord's overflowing blessing, must on their part meet in full his conditions. By reading the above text carefully we will discover that the conditions of this blessing are that all the tithes must be brought in, before the blessing comes. We heard of a farmer's wife who promised the Lord a tenth of the season's make of butter before it was made, but at the end of the season she had so much butter, and the price was so good, that she decided that the part she had given in consecration was too large, and withheld it. None of these people would think of breaking their agreement with men, yet they think it a light matter to break their covenant with God. But the sad result is, the windows of heaven no longer open to them, and no overflowing blessing comes from their lips in songs and testimonies. Although the songs and testimonies are kept up as a dry lifeless form. The text is much in the form of a challenge to any or all who will test it, and all who truly value blessings from heaven should at once meet the conditions. The poured out blessing is unknown to a great mass of professing Christians, because they never honestly bring in all the tithes. Some are very much afraid of so great a blessing as that which overflows. They have perhaps had a degree of joy, but never fulness of joy nor overflowing joy. Such a blessing would greatly shock the cold formal churches of the present day. The text suggests the reason why the windows of heaven are closed to many, why revivals are so rare and

so limited. It also suggests why there is such a scarcity of spiritual meat in his house. Dry theological bones are no substitute for soul nourishing food. It is almost inexcusable that the great Almighty and all wise God of heaven must be worshipped in houses, in many cases, mortgaged to ungodly men, and his servants paid with money raised by methods other than that God himself has provided. If the people of God, the professed people of God, would bring all the tithes into the storehouse, the church would be done with beggary, and with Peter would say to every ungodly man, "Thy money perish with thee." When even offered to one of God's servants to purchase a position in the church of Christ.

Beloved, if we want the windows of heaven opened to us, and a great overflowing blessing poured out to us let us meet God's conditions and it will surely come.

THE CANADIAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

September 16th, 1907.

To the Ministers in charge of congregations:

Dear Brethren,—The British and Foreign Bible Society was founded "to encourage the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures—without note or comment." A study of the operations of the Society, in the one hundred and three years of its history, will fill the devout heart with gratitude to God. Since its foundation, 204,000,000 copies of the Scriptures—complete or in parts—have been issued from its presses, at a cost of \$75,000,000. Philologists compute that "about 2,000 different languages and dialects are spoken by man." Already God's Word has been printed and published in 500 of these languages and dialects—reaching about seven-tenths of mankind. Of these Versions, the British and Foreign Bible Society has provided 409—nine new languages were added to the list last year, and ten the year before. The "ever-growing desire" of the people for the Word of God the "open" and "opening" doors for its circulation, make such imperative demands on the Society's resources, that to maintain present efficiency the annual free contributions must be largely increased.

"The Canadian Bible Society, Auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society," aims to place a Bible "into every home in British North America," and to bring all lovers of the Holy Word, within its territory, into prayerful, generous, intelligent sympathy with "The British and Foreign Bible Society in its world-wide work." Last year the Canadian Auxiliary distributed the Bible—complete or in parts—in British North America in sixty languages. This year more than seventy versions will be required to meet the need in Canada. The great "invasion" is bringing to our shores people from most of the countries of the world. The races cradled in the East are coming at the rate of over one thousand a day. They are Canada's living problem—and a sacred charge upon all earnest Christians. Without the saving salt of God's Word a hybrid pagan civilization will be established in Canada's rich and spacious West. It is a serious thing to be entrusted with facilities and constructive influences when the foundations of Empire are being laid; and a great privilege to assist in the undoing of the curse of Babel, and the multiplying of the blessings of Pentecost in our great and growing land. The fate of Canada depends on Bible distribution now.

The representatives of the Canadian Bible Society have been most cordially received in every Protestant

Church Court, and strong resolutions adopted commending the work to the hearty support of the people. Therefore, I respectfully request—in order to secure this important end—that on the first Sabbath in November sermons be preached on the work and claims of the Bible Society. The object of these sermons to be educational—emphasizing the absolute necessity of providing the Word of God for every man in his own language, and encouraging the Church by a statement of what has been done. To missions, representing every section of Reformed Christendom, the Society sends out all the Scriptures which they ask for to carry on their work abroad—acting in this vital and high service as Christ's steward, and fulfilling its function with no niggardly hand. It co-operates with the missionaries in preparing the Versions, prints the editions needed, bears the loss involved in sales at reduced prices, and pays carriage on the books to mission-stations in the remotest corners of the earth. And may I request a special reference to the fact that missionaries of every branch of the Church act as the most zealous and effective distributors of the Vernacular Scriptures—which they obtain from the Bible Society practically without expense to their missions.

Let me ask you to consult with the President of your Branch, and, if the date named is not the best, arrange to present the claims of the Society at the most convenient and suitable time. The Bible Society year closes with the 31st of December; we are anxious that all returns from the Branches and congregations shall be by that date in the hands of the Treasurer.

The Second Report of the Canadian Bible Society, and a Leaflet entitled "The Invasion",—containing an admirable presentation of Bible work, and indicating present opportunity and responsibility—can be obtained from the officers of the local Society, or the District Secretary.

I regard it as very important that the sermon shall be delivered and the literature distributed in the congregations before the Collectors enter upon their work.
