DEATH OF A HELPER IN PERFECTING UNION.

In a recent number of the Maritime Baptist we noticed in a letter written to that paper by the Rev. J. H. Hughes, who spoke of the progress of union among the churches, and stated that "a few more funerals were needed before it would be complete." The idea is quite suggestive, but rather hard on the people who loved the denomination in which they had laboured, and for which they had made many sacrifices to further its enterprises. Our sympathies have been stirred many times for old people who had laboured hard and economized all their life to build up a home for themselves and their families, and when the infirmities of age came on they gave over the property to their sons or daughters, and afterwards were made to feel that they were in the way, and even their death would be welcomed. So we can see these dear people all over our country who have laboured and sacrificed to build up a church home for themselves and their children, who now feel that they are homeless, yet too proud in heart to go to the home of another son. No other home would be the same to them. We do not believe it is from stubbornness or bigotry in all cases that many of these people were not in favour of union, but the very fibre of all of these lives have been interwoven with their church and denomination. Our own experience in 1888 when we were pushed out of our denominational home, gives us a very real sense of how these people feel, and a sincere sympathy for them.

The union, or oneness, that Jesus Christ taught was not to be brought about by physical death, for he said, "I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from the evil." But yet there is a death for the destruction of the body of sin, as expressed by Paul to the Romans. "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed." Rom. 6:6 that we need pass through to have real spiritual union. Physical death may be needful to perfect organic union,

but the crucifixion of the old man is an absolute need to perfect the oneness prayed for by our Lord.

THE ALLIANCE MEETINGS.

The Alliance is composed of the ministers and delegates of the Reformed Baptist churches. Every church should be represented by one or more delegates, and as far as possible they should be chosen from the standard bearers of the churches, with the disposition and ability to help in the business of the Alliance. There is much important business in connection with the denominational work that requires experienced men and women to ensure the best results. The camp grounds, the missionary work, and THE HIGHWAY are matters of general interest among the churches. Every church should be specially interested in these departments of our work, and do all they can to make them successful, and should always have delegates at the Alliance to look after their interests. As a rule our ministers attend the meetings of the Alliance, and yet it would be well for some to start a few days before the beginning of the Alliance, so as to have their private business in the city done up, so they will not miss any of the sessions. The churches should send laymen to do the business in running the Alliance and Camp Meeting in the several departments, so the ministers can give all their time to the spiritual work. Generally the greater part of the time of six ministers is devoted to the business of running the different departments. Beloved, send us men to take this work, and relieve the ministry from it.

BEULAH CAMP MEETING.

The question that is going around now is, Are you going to Beulah? Some perhaps are saying "I can't afford to," when in fact you cannot afford to miss the opportunity. Body and mind and soul need the refreshing to be found at this beautiful place, "Beulah Camp Grounds." It becomes more beautiful every year, and is indeed a sacred spot to hundreds of people. For at this place God gave them "Beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the Spirit of heaviness, that they might be called trees of righteousness the planting of the Lord, that he might be glorified." Many date great blessings received by them to previous visits of Dr. Carradine at Beulah Camp Ground. Dr. Carradine comes from California to attend Robie and Beulah Camp Meetings. BEULAH CAMP MEETING.



On account of not being able to get Dr. Carradine until July 8-17, and also the backwardness of spring, The Alliance Executive have decided it advisable to postpone the meeting of the Alliance from June 26th to July 3rd. So now the dates of the Alliance and Camp Meeting at Beulah Camp Ground will be July 3-17. This will be only two days later than we frequently close the camp meeting and as our Camp Meeting at Riverside is a week later than usual it will not keep us away from home any longer than usual.

The price of board will be the same as last year, viz 60c. per day or \$3 00 per week. Rooms 25, 40 and 50 cents per day according to location. People going should take their sheets, pillows, pillow cases and extra blankets when possible to do so.

ANOTHER PROPOSAL OF UNION.

The Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene has sent out an open letter from which we clip the following extract:

"The new church, in accord with the arrangements by which the two bodies were made one, are to meet in their delegated capacity, in Chicago, Ill., October 10, 1907, for the purpose of perfecting the necessary provisions and regulations for the government of the united body. The Commission to whom has been delegated the work of preparing for said meeting, feel that it is possible that there may be other denominations or independent churches, of like faith and purpose, who feel called to a closer fellowship and more perfect unity with other bodies; and we would therefore invite any such to unite with us, in what we believe to be this larger possibility of combined effort, as well as closer fellowship."

She was taken very ill on Saturday night, the 11th, and on Sunday morning her husband was phoned for. He arrived from Gordonsville in the afternoon but to his great grief found his wife unconscious in which state she remained until her release came at 8.15 Monday evening.

Sister Jones professed religion when young and was a faithful child of God and for years past gave definite testimony to the fullness of the blessing of Christ. Sister Jones was a daughter late Capt. William Snow of Victoria Cor., and sister of the late Mrs. John Raymond of Middle Simonds. She had but two children; William of Gordonsville and Azalea Blanche, wife of Rev. Chas. Stirling of Upper Wicklow; these, with her husband and one sister, Mrs. Nat Shaw of Upper Woodstock, she leaves to mourn the loss of a faithful wife, affectionate mother and kind friend. Her enthusiasm for the church which she joined when young and for the spread of the glorious gospel throughout the world had its inspiration in her love and loyalty to Jesus Christ whom she knew by blessed experience as Saviour and Lord. It can well be said of Sister Jones, she hath done what she could and she being dead yet speaketh.

Her funeral was largely attended and in the absence of her minister was conducted at Gordonsville by Rev. G. A. Giberson.
