Death of Sanford C. Baker.

Sanford C. Baker, publisher and proprietor of the Oakdale Graphic, died last Thursday morning at ten o'clock, after a brief iliness Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at two o'clock from the Methodist church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. U. Simmons.

Mr. Baker was born in Woodstock, New Brunswick, January 6th, 1834. In early manhood he shipped across the Atlantic to Ireland and thence to California around Cape Horn. He landed in San Francisco in 1856 and shortly after located at Red Bluff, where he established the Tehama Observer. Here he was married to Miss Augusta Pinkham, of Boothbay, Me. They afterwards removed to Vallejo where Mr. Baker was identified with the Valleto Recorder. Selling out his interest in that paper he went to Sacramento and held a position on the Sacramento Union, and then to San Francisco where he worked on the leading dailies: Call, Chronicle, Bulletin.

The proprietor of The Graphic, came to Oakdale in 1881 and has since been a resident of the town, using his influence in every way for the advancement of the people and the town. Twenty three years ago he established the Graphic and until the last was the publisher and proprietor.
