Rev. C. T. Phillips was honored at the recent convocation of Acadia with the degree of D. D.

Dr. W. C. Kierstead's historical sketch of the United Baptist Church at Woodstock contained the following kindly worded reference to the Reformed Baptists. Its tone is so different from all references of the past, that we appreciate it very much.

"In the year 1888 the church suffered a great loss in membership through the formation of the Reformed Baptist church, already referred to in connection with the history of the Baptists of this town. The former pastor, Rev. G. W. MacDonald and a large number of faithful and earnest workers went into the new denomination, families were divided and religious feeling was intense. But the years calm the feelings and bring added insight. The Free Baptist church survived her loss and lived and prospered and the hand of God still guided her and those who went out from her membership were neither fanatics nor cranks, but earnest, conscientious men and women, following the light given to them, and walking in obedience to duty as it is presented to them. Today we respect and esteem the Reformed Baptist church of this town, with its membership of earnest, consecrated men and women, and gladly cooperate with them and with their pastor in the common work of the Kingdom. Our agreement is far more fundamental than our difference and we are close cousins, if not brothers in the Baptist household of faith."

The same sketch contains the following reference to our late Brother MacDonald:

"In even a brief narration of the history of this church two pastors at least, deserve mention, Rev. G. W. MacDonald and Rev. C. T. Phillips. Brother MacDonald was a strong preacher, with evangelistic power, a man of executive ability, a wise, fruitful pastor, a leader, and a consecrated man of God, true to the light given him.
