Quarterly Meeting.

Quarterly meeting of District No 1 convened as per appointment with the church at Lower Brighton, June 11th, 12th and 13th.

There was a meeting Thursday evening, June 10th, led by Bro Fred T Wright.

Social meeting on Friday night led by the pastor Dr H C Sanders.

Love feast at 9.30 Friday morning, at 10.30 preaching by Bro H S Dow.

Business meeting at 2.30 p. m. The Pres. Bro J S Richardson, in the chair. After singing Rev S A Baker offered prayer, followed by a number of testimonies. Bro Sabine was chosen Sec protem.

S B Charlton arrived and took his seat as Secretary.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The following officers were elected for the quarter: Bro H C Sanders, Pres; S B Charlton, Sec; B R Burt, Treas; S A Baker, Highway agent.

The following devotional committee was appointed: Bros G B Trafton, B R Burt and H C Sanders.

Written reports were received from the following churches:

Millville. Much work had been done during the past quarter. Sinners had been saved, backsliders reclaimed and believers sanctified. The best year they had enjoyed for some time.

Lower Hainesville. No special work had been done, but regular services well attended. Faithful preaching by the pastor.

Maple Ridge. Special services were held and victory won. Bro Richardson preaches a full gospel and it is appreciated.

Geary. Meetings well attended and spiritually increasing. No regular pastor. Bro G B Trafton gave them much help previous to his illness, and interested others to come who have been a great help to us.

Perth. Perth is a new church and this is their first report. It is an encouraging one. It is blessed of God and being a blessing to that town.

Gordonsville. Also a new church and their first report. God is wonderfully blessing them. They have services every Sabbath and Sabbath school. Bro H S Dow preaches every alternate Sabbath.

Verbal reports from Woodstock and Hartland. God is with them and they are courageous to press the battle for holiness and against sin.

Upper Hainesville reports the Lord is blessing them. The pastor is expecting to start special meetings soon. He has been busily engaged in other parts of the field. Bro Richardson gave a glowing report of the field in which he labors which includes several churches.

Prospects look good, the parsonage at Millville is nearing completion although not begun until late in October of last year.
