Missionary Boxes.

We set out a few weeks ago to gather new and second hand clothing to fill a case to send to our missionaries in South Africa, and we wish to report good progress, so far we have received three boxes of goods from St. John, one from Moncton, a large parcel from Mrs. S. McLeod of Newcastle, a package from Perth, a package from Lutz Mountain, a parcel from Gordonsville, and a large lot of articles from Hartland, and we have gathered considerable in Woodstock, and also received a nice lot of new goods from Perth. The ladies of the Woodstock W. C. T. U. are engaged making a nice lot of articles to be distributed by our missionaries, which we appreciate very much, a gentleman in Woodstock outside of our congregation, gave us four good coats, four pairs of pants and two vests. So by the tenth of June we expect to ship three or four good sized cases to be used in clothing the needy. You will also notice in another note the amount contributed to pay the freight and duty on these goods, we will need considerable more yet, as the distance is long and the expences are heavy.
