Quarterly Meeting.

Quarterly Meeting District No. 1 convened at Millville, N. B., March 25, 1909.

Rev. J. S. Richardson conducted the Thursday evening service, speaking from the 51st Psalm.

Friday morning service was led by S. B. Charlton, reading Eph. 3. 2:30 p. m., preaching by Rev. S. A. Baker.

Bro. S. A. Baker preached a strong sermon in the evening from James 4:8, last clause.

Morning on Saturday was led by Bro. John Golding, reading John 15.

Business meeting at 2:30. Rev. J. S. Richardson opened the meeting with song and prayer.

Pres. and Sec. were both absent. Bro. B. R. Burt was elected President pro tem. On motion of Bro. Chute, seconded by Bro. Abner Sharp, Bro. Richardson was elected President; Sister Dorothy Kimball, Highway agent. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Reports from the different churches was then read which were very encouraging. The following churches reported by letter:

Marysville.—Although the pastor has been unable to attend to his duties since Christmas, the church is enjoying the blessing of God. Souls are being saved and sanctified.

Millville reports victory, and their pastor, Bro. Richardson a faithful minister of the word in all its fullness.

Maple Ridge have maintained their meetings as far as possible. Bad weather and roads permitting, they kept up the week night prayer meeting, and spoke very highly of their pastor.

Hartland reported enjoying the blessing of God. Special services were held during the winter resulting in victory for souls. They spoke very appreciatively of Bro. and Sister Sanders.

Lower Brighton, reports their membership small; mostly young people attend the services and listen attentively. Special services were held last fall with good results. Have not been able to keep up the week night prayer meeting.

Fort Fairfield.—We are still in the fight, but we are holding on to God and believing God for victory. Our pastor has been away much of the time in special work.

Bro. Richardson preaches straight gospel.

Bro. Richardson gave a rousing talk on the loss by compromise in testimony.

It was certainly a peculiar business meeting; the various reports were interspersed with song and testimony.

An invitation was received from the church at Lower Brighton for the Quarterly Meeting in June. Invitation accepted. They to fix the date.

It was announced that Bros. G. B. McDonald and H. H. Cosman would be present over the Sabbath.

Devotional Com. reported the following arrangement of services: Rev. H. H. Cosman, Sat. evening; Rev. G. B. McDonald, Sunday 10:30; Rev. H. H. Cosman, Sunday 2:30; Rev. G. B. McDonald, Sunday 7:00.

On motion a vote of thanks was extended to the people of Millville for their kind hospitality.

The meeting closed after 6 o'clock with an altar service two for pardon and two for cleansing; they all got the victory. Meeting adjourned. After the evening meeting the Pres. called the delegates together for a business meeting. After prayer the Pres. announced that Bro. McDonald pronounced the business meet-

ing irregular, and called on the Bro. to explain. He said it was irregular and illegal because according to the constitution it was necessary for two ordained ministers present in order to do business and as these were not present there was no quorum.

Moved by Bro. G. B. McDonald, seconded by Bro. B. R. Burt, that we now assemble in regular session to ratify in toto the business of the afternoon, irregularly transacted by there not being a properly constituted quorum present. Carried.

On motion a welcome was extended to Rev. Bro. H. H. Cosman who was present with us, as a visitor from another district, and that we extend to him our hospitality, and a cordial greeting, with the prayer that his presence among us may be a blessing to all.

Bro. Cochrane, of Marysville, called attention to the fact that at the last quarterly meeting held at that place, a vote was passed urging upon the ministers the necessity of putting forth an extra effort to be present at the Quarterly sessions, and the present situation made the necessities of the case more apparent, and he felt that if this meeting was to be maintained the ministers would have to make provision in their time for attendance at the conventions.

Adjourned to meet at Lower Brighton in June.

Love feast announced for Sunday morning at 9:00. A large number had gathered long before that hour and enjoyed a prayer, praise and testimony meeting.

The love feast at 9:00 a. m. was led by Bro. Thos. Wolverson of Four Falls, Leson from 1 John 3. It was a service of blessing to souls.

Two young men came to the altar for Sanctification, just before 9:00 o'clock meeting; the same who received pardon the day previous.

Rev. G. B. McDonald preached at 10:30; text Psalm 139:23, 24. It was a searching discourse. We are preparing some extracts from the sermon for publication in the HIGHWAY.

Rev. H. H. Cosman preached in the afternoon from John 17:20, 23.

"God bestowed his nature upon Jesus. And he uses the same language in speaking of his bestowments upon us as upon Jesus. God has not given us according to our ability to understand, but he goes beyond the possibilities of our comprehension."

Seven stood for prayers desiring to be sanctified, and two for pardon.

A song service characterised the opening of the evening service. It broke out spontaneously. Before the sermon a call was made for contributions to the parsonage fund.

Rev. G. B. McDonald preached from Gen. 3:9, Where art thou?

"Some have tried to eliminate God out of the arrangement of creation. But it requires less of our credulity to believe God's plan, than the plan that scientists have tried to arrange. The devil began his destructive work where God completed his creative work. Adam alienated himself from God, and so has mankind today and as he fled from God, So man today flees from God when conviction comes upon him and he is not willing to yield."

It was a strong sermon to Sinners; at its close eight or ten came to the altar for pardon, nearly all testifying that God had forgiven them.

Monday morning there was a grand jubilee service it was a powerful meeting, everyone testifying to having been helped in the meetings, some to have been especially blessed.

It was a strong convention all through. The presence of the Spirit was very manifest from the start. And there was not a lull from beginning to end. Much definite good was accomplished.

Rev. S. A. Baker had to go home on Saturday, and we missed his presence with us.

The greater part of the ministers were conspicuous by their absence. Some were sick, others were engaged in special work elsewhere.

The meeting broke up about 10:30 a. m. Monday. The verdict being unanimous that the Quarterly Meeting had been a decided success.
