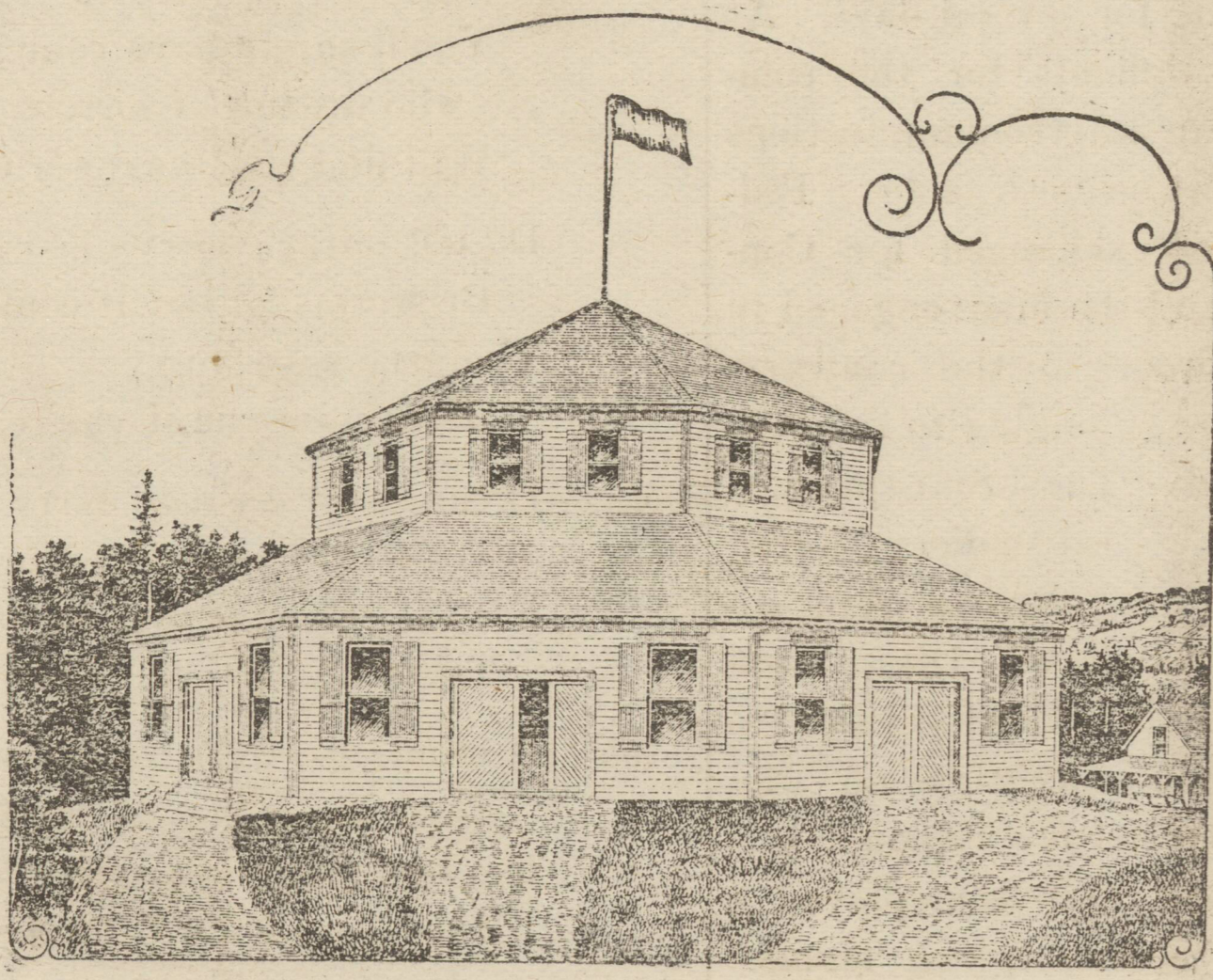


BEULAH CAMP MEETING

CORRESPONDENCE.

REFORMED BAPTIST MISSION,
PAULPIETERSBURG, Natal, S. A.
April 5th, 1909.

Dear readers of the HIGHWAY.—As you near the Easter holidays again, we trust that the blessing of God be upon you in a larger measure than ever before. My prayer is that you who have risen with Christ may so fully sink into His life that henceforth we may feel the power of His resurrection conforming us entirely to His will and making us indeed alive to our opportunities for furthering His cause in all lands.

From now on for the next few months your hinderances in the work will be less, as the snow is melting away so you no longer will be obliged to spend your strength battling with drifts. We too are looking forward to a more convenient season for the work though like you we are doing the best we can now. The watching time in the gardens will soon be over among the natives then more will be free to attend services.

God has been reminding us again lately of the need of haste in His work. Two weeks ago yesterday the writer was over near Pongola to hold a service at the Shillemba but our expected congregation did not arrive. We however talked to two brothers of Petro, who were sick, the elder with a cold, apparently, the younger with consumption, we judge. Well a week ago last Sunday news reached us that the elder brother died three days after our visit and the other was taken by his father to his Kraal in the Transvaal. So Petro's home is now broken up, his mother also having gone to another Kraal, and that was the last opportunity we will have of pressing home the truths of the gospel upon those two men. Also the mother of uSala, a girl whom we had working for us, died suddenly so she was obliged to return home. Thus many are going out in darkness and our skirts will be clean of their blood only as we do our

best to carry the message of salvation to them before it is too late.

A short time ago \$5.00 reached us from Mrs. Alex Johnston for to help in building a native church in the district where Samyeli is working. For this offering we thank her. We hope to put up a building there during the coming dry season. Our church garden has not been reaped yet but he hope to get at least four or five sacks of corn, which will be worth £3 or more this year. That we think, will also be used in building a church in Aloni's district, near the Junction of the Pongola and Pevan rivers. There we will have to be content, with a building made of a frame work of poles thatched with grass on the outside. We may also put up such a building in one of the other principal out posts on this side. Solomon also desires to build a church at his home. So we have written the government asking for two building sites on that side of the river. If all these buildings are put up you can see that our hands will be full all the time we can spare from the station, travelling, superintending the work.

We had a very good day here yesterday, though the people were late in coming. Just before the communion service, a woman whose name was Nomuhlati, followed her Lord in the ordinance of baptism. Samyeli's three converts who desire baptism did not arrive but they will likely follow before long. The most of our church members at home seem to be in good standing, so we are looking forward to greater victory in the work.

God is with us keeping and blessing us as a family, for which we praise Him! Continue in prayer for us all that the work may be carried on according to God's plan.

Dear HIGHWAY:—It has been some time since I wrote to your columns but I am glad to report victory. I am still trusting in Jesus, who saves, sanctifies and keeps me day by day. This has been the best year of my life. I have enjoyed day by day the conscious feeling of the presence of the eternal God. I have received a unanimous call for another year. I have one month to decide I think I shall remain. Where he leads I will follow, I am sure he led me here and just as soon as He says go, I am bound to go. Amen.

We are to have the next quarterly meeting here in June 18, 19 and 20th. Anyone who may have a desire to come, will be well cared for, and I feel sure will receive a fresh blessing from the Lord. Our quarterly meetings are seasons of great strength and blessing to all usually ending in someone getting saved. There is such harmony and love among the brethren and sisters that God must work. Brethren pray for us.
