EDITORIAL.

Beulah Notes.

The Editor visited Beulah Camp Ground on the 11th and found that Brother Bullock is progressing well with the great work of improving Beulah. The undertaking is both extensive and expensive, no faint hearted man would be competent to carry it through, as there are many hinderances and drawbacks to be overcome, which have been fully demonstrated in the heavy down-pour of rain experienced recently which not only hindered the work but did much damage, the loss being not less than \$75.00. It would be difficult to give a description of the work that is being done as a person needs to see it to get a proper estimate of it. It includes several weeks of labour, day and night, for six men and a horse, with a tramway and cars, removing 100 train car loads, equal to about 200 dump cart loads every 24 hours from the place which is to be the bed of the artificial lake. And a ditch from five to eight feet deep, 900 feet long, for sewer and water pipe. And excavating in a bank of solid brick clay, a space about 80x100 feet and 7 feet deep for the new Hotel cellar. And digging and putting in a large ceptic pool, beside this is a culvert about 100 feet long for the waste water from the lake. The building of a dam to hold the water at the outlet of the lake, the removal of the old fence and putting up a wire fence 100 rods long, including five gates, and many minor changes. Besides all these things is the procuring of materials and the erection of the New Hotel, and changing the old one into sleeping rooms, which means the largest expenditure in labour and money that we have ever undertaken for the advancement of the work of the Lord. We have placed the order for nearly one hundred thousand feet of lumber for new Hotel, and expects to have all the materials required in its erection on the grounds before the river freezes over. And we expect to have everything in readiness for Beulah's greatest Camp Meeting in the season of 1910. We are confident the Lord is with us in this grand advance movement. When completed Beulah will be the best equipped Camp Ground in North America. With an electric light plant it would reach close to the point of perfection for the purposes for which it is established.
