History of the Organization of the R. B. Church at Norton.

A number of the brethren and sisters in and around Norton, who were desirous of seeing the work of God advanced, in that section, planned for a Holiness convention, to begin on Thursday evening, Oct. 14th, and to continue over ten days. Rev. P. J. Trafton was invited to take charge and Rev. E. W. Lester and Bro. Herbert Innis were to assist. Rev. E. W. Lester had charge of the singing and did it well. Instead of running for ten days the meetings ran till Nov. 7th. Rev. M. S. Trafton, of St. John, came up to help over Sundays, Oct. 24th and Nov. 7th. God put his seal on the services; several were converted or reclaimed, and some Sanctified, and the Saints greatly refreshed. To God be all the Glory.

Before the meetings began the Presbyterian brethren thinking that their building was to small, decided to build a new church, so offered the old one for sale. Some of the brethren thought it would be well to buy it, so that the Holiness people would have a place to hold their meetings in. At the close of the meeting on Monday night, Oct. 18th, the friends were called together to talk the matter over, and the following resolutions were adopted. 1st. That we appoint a committee to wait on the committee appointed by the Presbyterian church. The committee appointed were Bros. E. T. Harmer, W. R. Carson and Jas. Robertson. 2d. That the committee appointed have power to buy the church at a price not to exceed five hundred and fifty dollars. In the course of a few days the committees met and after considerable deliberation the building was bought for \$550.00. The Holiness people now had a church building but no kind of an organization, so it was decided by them that they should have a Reformed Baptist church organized. The organization to take place on Monday evening, Nov. 1st. It was a fine night and the church was crowded to the doors. The ministers present were: Rev's. W. B. Wiggins, B. A., Moncton; M. S. Trafton and Henry Smith, St. John; P. J. Trafton, Fort Fairfield, Me.; E. W. Lester, Mercer Settlement, and Lie. A. F. Tanner, Norton. The council consisted of the Ordained ministers present and Bro's. E. Cosman, St. John; Noah Hicks, Lower Millstream; Douglas and Bedford Hayes, Mercer. Rev. E. W. Lester had charge of the song service. Rev. M. S. Trafton preached a powerful sermon from Acts 2:47. Rev. W. B. Wiggins, B. A., presented the Bible, explained to some extent the articles of Faith, and read the covenant. Lie. A. T. Tanner offered the prayer of consecration. Rev. Henry Smith gave the hand of Fellowship, after which they all joined hands and sang, "Blest be the tie that binds," &c. Rev. P. J. Trafton gave the charge, after which the congregation was dismissed with the benediction by Rev. E. W. Lester. The Charter membership of the church is sixteen. The following officers were elected: Deacons, W. R. Carson, E. A. Harmer; Clerk, E. A. Harmer; Treas., Mrs. E. A. Harmer; Trustees, James Robertson, Charles Murphy, Manning Huggard. At a subsequent meeting, Rev. E. W. Lester was elected pastor. We thank God for this little band that is starting out with such bright prospects, and pray that they all may be true to God and Holiness, and that such as are being saved, shall be added to their numbers.
