OBITUARY.

Albert W. Tracy, beloved husband of Adelia E. Tracy and father of Rev. Leighton S. Tracy of Buldana, India, and Mrs. Frank C. Smith, of Vancouver, B. C., passed to his reward at seven o'clock Wednesday evening, June 22, 1910.

He was a godly man, triumphant in health, triumphant in sickness, triumphant in death. Just before the Lord came for him, his wife drew near to hear him repeating tenderly, "Jesus, Jesus, Jesus." Then all was over.

He had suffered for years with indigestion and was confined to his bed for the last twelve months of his life. During all his illness his trust in God, his unwavering faith, his responses of praise were a benediction. His life was remarkable for its unbroken fellowship with God and his keen interest in the missionary cause. He was born in Waterville, N. B. on September 27, 1847, where he resided until he came to California in 1907. At the age of eighteen he was converted and united with the Free Baptist church. After an earnest christian life of eighteen years he received the blessing of entire sanctification and has walked in close fellowship with God ever since. In 1883, during a severe, continued opposition to the doctrine of holiness he was asked to unite with the Reformed Baptist Church, as a charter member.

He was married to Miss Adelia Boyer in 1875. In 1904 he had the privilege of giving his only son, Rev. L. S. Tracy to the missionary cause in connection with the Pentecostal church at Haverhill, Mass., and the son still labors as our missionary at Buldana, India.

On coming to San Diego, in October 1907 he and his wife united with the Pentecostal church of the Messianic as charter members, and have been loyally devoted to its cause. We shall miss our brother.

Besides a faithful wife, a son and a daughter he leaves three grandchildren. His funeral conducted by his pastor, Alpin M. Bower, assisted by Rev. E. M. Hutchens, was a tender service as it felt the influence of his godly life. The message was from Psalm 37:37 and Psalm 116:15. Mrs. G. D. Glass sang effectively "Jesus, oh, how sweet the Name," and "When our Ships have crossed the Ocean."
