Slow Poison.

"I suppose I have sold millions of cigarettes in my life," remarked a tobaccoist yesterday, "and I often wonder whether my doing so will be placed against my credit in the next world. It is the one part of my business that I positively loathe. I really think that at the rate cigarettes are now being consumed—and the rate is steadily increasing—the effect will be decidedly apparent in the next generation of mankind. The cigarette is a form of slow poison, which, while it may not result in death, must necessarily leave its effects upon the human system. You may not believe this, but during the warm weather I have noticed that if flies are shut in the case where cigarettes are kept they will die in less than five minutes. The very atmosphere seems to poison them.

Fatal Accident

A sad accident occured at Three Islands, Grand Manan in which Cleveland Griffin was shot with a gun in his own hands. He was hunting in the woods and was evidently carrying the gun on his shoulder when he stumbled forward and the charge entered his bowels. He made an alarm and was heard by Austin McFarland who alarmed his father, who was in a boat near by, he ran in haste to his assistance. He was hastily placed in a motor boat and taken to Grand Harbor to the office of Dr Johnson.

Dr McCauley was also called and the two doctors did all in their power to save him, but human skill failed and in a short time after his arrival; and only a little more than an hour after the accident, he passed away. His mother was sent for but did not arrive in time to hear his last words.

He had never professed religion, but was a thoughtful young man, a regular Sabbath school and meeting attender, and of a very cheerful disposition.

After the accident he took in his tense pain, he knew he had not long to live, and cried to God for pardon; He was pointed to Jesus by his father, who was by his side, and prayed earnestly for him. Prayer was offered by Rev Mr Brown, and he died rejoicing in Jesus.

Deceased was twenty-two years of age, was the second son of James and Ella Griffin of North Head, Grand Manan, and is survived by his father and two sisters. Three brothers, Frank of Two Islands, Harleigh and Theodore at home, Mrs Frank Bagley, of Lubec, Me. Miss Bertha, of Woodstock, Helen, Nora and Myrtle at home.

The large number of floral offerings and large attendance at the funeral showed the high esteem in which he and the family were held. Much sympathy is felt for the family, and may God bless and sanctify the affliction to the good of all. By request the funeral was attended by Rev J H Coy assisted by Rev Mr Brown.
