Therefore Resolved, that we, as the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist church of Canada, unite with the "Womens Christian Temperance Union" of the Dominion, in requesting that our Dominion Parliament pass such measure, or law, as shall give the right of voting to all women over 21 years of age, who are Canadian citizens.
