The Laymen's Missionary Movement is planning a series of meetings for the Maritime Provinces from April 3rd to 15th.

Secretary Caskey of the Inter-Denominational Office in Toronto, with several of the Denominational Secretaries, will be in St. John March 12th, and from that time on will give their time exclusively to preparations for the meetings in this section.

They are already in correspondence with the Clergy and Laymen at different points, and anticipate holding meetings at the following centres; provided the Laymen and Clergy at these points desire the meetings;—

There will be a two day session at each place, opening with a supper the first night, and a Conference the second day as to Methods of Work in the Community and the Individual Congregation. It is expected that in addition to the Laymen's Secretaries there will be one or more Laymen from Montreal and Toronto, as well as representatives of the Movement from St. John and Halifax, who will assist in the meetings.

It is expected that the points where meetings are not held will arrange to send delegates to the centre that is nearest them, in order to carry the enthusiasm of their meetings back to their own parish, as has been done all through Ontario and the Western Provinces.

L. G. Kimball.

All who knew Brother L. G. Kimball of Fort Fairfield, familiarly known as Bro. Lev. Kimball, will regret to learn of his death, which to him was a translation, which took place at his late home on the evening of the 23rd inst. Brother Kimball was born at Waterville, Carleton Co. N. B. and was 44 years of age. He with his brothers Frank T. and Bird H. Kimball went to Fort Fairfield about 15 years ago and became one of the successful farmers of that place, when holiness was first preached at Robie, where he then lived, he was a strong opposer to it, but while Brothers G. B. and M. S. Trafton held a convention at that place, he got under deep conviction and sought and found the blessing, and from that time became its most zealous advocate. He with the brethren of like precious faith has been instrumental in untold good in Fort Fairfield and the surrounding country for many miles, both by their personal work and by employing prominent evangelists and holding holiness conventions at a cost of many hundreds of dollars, and during this present winter Brother Kimball has devoted his time to holding revival meetings in which he had great success. One of the best revivals ever held at Caribou in which there were nearly 200 seekers, among whom many were converted, and a large number were sanctified wholly, the revival is still in progress. He was called in the very height of his victory, his sun will never set. All who knew "Brother Lev" sincerely mourn his departure, and sympathize with Sister Kimball and the five children, who have sustained so great a loss. A very impressive service was held at his late residence on the 25th inst, conducted by Rev. M. S. Trafton, assisted by Rev. Mr. Richmond, Congregationalist; Rev. Mr. Fergusson, F. Baptist and Rev. Mr. Tingle, Methodist.

The Woodstock Male Quartette, composed of F. L. Mooers, George H. Arnold, H. Lockwood and E. M. Campbell were present and sung three selections which were highly appreciated. It was said by those present to be the most impressive service they ever attended. It was a real baptism of tears, where even strong men could not restrain themselves.
