The Valley Railway.

According to the present outlook the Valley Railroad must be built, as the people all along the river are greatly aroused over the question regardless of political party. Both parties want the road.

The building of the Valley railway will be a great boon for 'Beulah Camp Grounds,' bringing the up river towns and villages within a few hours ride and St. John city within one hours ride of the Camp Ground, making a large saving in time and expense and will multiply the attendance many fold, and naturally increase the value, and no doubt will give it a great building boom. Cottages and rooms are already in demand, and of course with a high standard railway passing close by will greatly increase the demand. This spring will be a good time to build cottages, as there will be a large force of carpenters on the ground working at the hotel, and while there they can put up several cottages if persons intending to build will make early preparations. Dressed (planed) lumber for cottage building can be placed on the ground from \$12.00 to \$16.00 per thousand feet. A large number of beautiful lots have been added by the enlargement of Beulah Camp Ground. So there are ideal locations for from fifty to one hundred new cottages. The whole ground is now in one enclosure surrounded by a very nice wire fence, with gates entering the public road at convenient points. A grand future is assured for Beulah. Too much cannot be said in commendation of Brother J. F. Bullock's labour, courage and unlimited determination by which he overcame numerous difficulties and made many sacrifices, and has written his name all over Beulah in everything the eye falls upon, the walks, the fountains, the flowers, the shrubs, the gates, the avenues, the bridges, the rustic fences, beautiful waste boxes book room, the public road, the watering places for horses, the beautiful lake, the grounds, the climax will be the new hotel with its modern

conveniences. Associated with Bro. J. F. Bullock is his generous father and mother who are hand in hand in every good work.

The beauty of the place will surely attract large numbers of people, but will not detract from the purpose for which it was established. The propagation of the great scriptural works of divine grace, the regeneration of the sinner and the entire sanctification of the believer. We need quilts, comfortables, blankets, sheets and pillows cases. The men in the churches can give money to enable the women to purchase materials to make these things, hundreds of people have double the amount of bedding that they need in their homes, and keep beautiful quilts packed away that they never use. Why not give the Alliance some of those for the New Hotel? There is enough nice bedding packed away in chests and closets of our homes to furnish several hotels, that is never used. Come now unpack the chests and give generously for this great need. Beulah Camp Ground, the most beautiful spot in New Brunswick, belongs to the Reformed Baptist churches and every one of them should take a live interest in it. In two or three weeks work will be started in the erection of the building, and will be completed by June 15th. So all of our people need to bestir themselves and render all the help possible, every man, woman and child should contribute something to this work.
