Thursday evening, preaching by Bro H S Dow.

Friday a. m. Prayer service afternoon Preaching by Bro M S Blaisdell, Gal. 5:16 "Walk in the Spirit."

Evening service led by Bro C E Grant, preaching from John 7:17. "He that wills to do his will shall know of the doctrine."

Saturday a. m. meeting led by Bro Bliss McQuarry. Reading Titus 2, speaking from verse 14. Testimonies followed.

Business session met at 2 p m, Bro S H Clark, President, in the chair. S B Charlton, Secretary.

On motion of Bro Baker, Bro Jas Carr was granted a seat in the Quarterly Meeting representing the mission in Caribou, Me.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Bro H S Dow was elected president, J B Charlton, secretary; Bro Fred Boyd, treasurer, H S Clark, HIGHWAY agent.

The following letters were read: Marysville reports church in good spiritual condition, much gained by

the special services; are marching on to victory.

Millville is rejoicing over past victories and praising God, and praying and believing Him for victory in the months to come.

Hartland reports increasing interest, in the church services and Sabbath school. Souls were saved and believers wholly sanctified during the special services in the winter. Are more determined than ever to stand true to the cause of Holiness.

Lower Haynesville has been revived and much strengthened the past months. The regular and special services are well attended.

Fort Fairfield sends encouraging report; the Lord is blessing. The meetings are seasons of refreshing and souls are seeking God.

Much of their strength and effort is put in work in other places, and they are resting on the promise of God, "give and it shall be given," and are believing Him for a gracious outpouring in His own good time.

Perth says the past three months have been seasons of refreshing. The Lord is wonderfully blessing. The church has had a sifting time. Some have dropped out but others have come in. They have organized a Sabbath school. They are preparing to build a church and will gladly welcome any assistance toward that end.

Four Falls, the spiritual condition of the church is good. Although the congregations are small, yet the interest and attention to the word is good. Are planning special services soon.

There was an unusual number of delegates present and nearly all had something to say of the home work, and all talked strong faith for the future, and praised God for the past.

Gordonsville was reported by Bro Norman Craig. The interest good. Although few in numbers God was leading and blessing.

Bro Mutch spoke for Woodstock. The Lord was blessing. Quite a few had moved away but God's Spirit was still with them. Have had no special work this winter because of sickness in the pastors family.

Bro Baker in speaking said that this winter was the first in twenty-five years that he had not been engaged in special work.

Bro Harris Cox, of Victoria, reports a united band. Although but few in numbers Gods was with them. Have many difficulties but are triumphant in His name. Meetings this winter are held in Bro Cox's house.

Waterville was represented by the only resident member Sister Kaye. In face of all the obstacles she is still praying and believing.

Lic M S Blaisdell reported for Meductic, said holiness preaching had driven some out, but souls were getting interested as to their standing.

Brother Moses Hillman, of Greenbush, reported the work as improving. Both Meductic and Greenbush were much blessed by Brother Blaisdell's straight preaching of holiness. Mrs Blaisdell spoke encouragingly of the prospect.

Middle Southampton had good attendance at the Sabbath evening service.

Lower Southampton. Not many to stand by the church, mostly old people. But Brother Blaisdell is strong in faith.

Bro Baker said this circuit had been neglected but believed there was yet to be a sweep of victory for those places as there had been in the past.

For Maple Ridge, Brother Dunlap said that he with most of the male members of the church has been away during the winter, but found when they came back that the fire was still burning in the prayer meetings, and

the absent ones had been kept in the lumber woods and other places they had been working.

Upper Haynesville, Brother Richardson, the pastor, said he preached twice a month but for six or seven weeks recently every Sunday appointment the weather was so bad he could not get there, but God was blessing.

Sister Mrs Melvin Hovey for Lower Brighton, said meetings were good, though numbers were small. Brothers Sabine and Mullen, of Woodstock, renders them good assistance when the pastor is absent.

Brother Jas Carr said the Mission in Caribou was out and out for holiness. Up to June last they had met from house to house. They then secured an old hall that was not in use and cleaned it out and fixed it up, and after they got it fitted up the owners raised the rent to \$150.00 per year and required that they pay three months in advance. They had to borrow the money to pay the quarter's rent. They asked for a collection at their meeting to help in this matter and got \$99.00; later they called for pledges for the work and got \$300.00. They engaged Mr Yates, a singing evangelist from the south, and had good success. They then tried to secure other help but none could be had. They then got Bro L G Kimball and they began a convention in January which lasted five weeks. 175 souls kneeling at the altar during that time.

This was Bro Kimball's last work. Rev. M S Trafton, of Fort Fairfield, came to their assistance and meetings were continued Bro Fred Wright and Sister Ella Slipp assisted greatly during the winter. They have now engaged Rev M S Trafton to be with them Sunday afternoons and Thursday evenings for one year.

The mission took in consideration a memorial for Bro Kimball and at the suggestion of Bro Trafton pledges were given for the support of a missionary in some heathen land and \$170.00 a year was pledged.

They had baptism in the river one Sunday and the next day some tried to get a warrant against Bro Trafton and have him driven out of town.

Royalton was reported by S B Charlton, an account of which will be found in another column.

Bro Blaisdell extended an invitation to the Quarterly Meeting to meet with the church at Greenbush in June. Invitation accepted.

A vote of thanks was extended to the people of Hartland for their hospitality.

Bro Baker spoke in the interests of the HIGHWAY and of its influence.

On motion of S B Charlton, seconded by S H Clark a vote of sympathy was extended to Bro and Sister Baker in their hour of trial. Bro Baker has only come up for the business meeting and had gone to the train. He could not remain away for they were hourly looking for the messenger to come to their home for the loved one. A unanimous standing vote was given.

After singing, "Blest be the tie that binds," Brother Dow pronounced the benediction. Saturday evening song service at 7.15. Preaching by Brother Clark at 7.30 from 2 Cor. 1:22. A testimony meeting followed.

The love feast Sunday morning began about 8.30 and continued until 10.30; it was a real love feast. At 10.30 Lic M S Blaisdell took charge and preached from James 4:8. It was a definite sermon on the two works of Grace. There was a crowded house at the 3 p m service,—some could not in. Lic Handley C Mullen from Matt 27:22.

The pastor of the United Baptist church requested Brother Dow to send

some one to preach in his church for the evening and Brother James Carr was appointed, who spoke very effectively to a full house. A testimony meeting followed.

Brother J S Richardson preached in our own church which was also crowded to the doors. The meeting run until 12 o'clock. There were about twenty at the altar, all claimed victory. Some came through with shining faces.

Altogether it was a grand meeting. All were full of faith and courage. A letter was read in the business meeting from Rev S Greenlaw expressing his regrets for not being able to attend the meeting as he was called to attend a funeral. There was a farewell meeting on Monday morning. It was a blessed season with 70 testimonies, and over twenty were at the altar. Some were converted, some were sanctified wholly.
