Paulpietersburg, Natal,
Nov. 7th, 1911.

Dear Highway:

It has been a long time, I believe, since I have written to your columns. But we are still plodding on doing the best we can, though the building of the church and cutting off rooms so our returning missionaries may have this house to themselves, has taken so much of our time that we have not been able to visit the different parts of the field as often as we would like.

The native workers are all doing the best they can. Petrose Jondo has been sick a good deal so he has not been able to do much travelling among the people, but he is, I think, enjoying the presence of the Holy Spirit in a fuller measure than ever before and as he has strength in doing what he can to promote the work.

Lidia is now with us and is doing good work among the people. She also has received a fresh anointing of the Spirit.

Josiah, Solomona's brother, is here in the work but is weak physically so he is unable to do a great deal of travelling.

Solomona and Samyeli are well and working away. Their people as well as our members on this side of the river are having a hard time because of the famine. Near Solomona's home they have to pay £1.5 a sack for corn now, and the weather at present is not favorable for early corn this year. It may be along in February before some have it ripe enough to use.

As we were unable to secure donkeys at a reasonable price we bought a horse to use with our other one for plowing at the station and helping our workers on this side of the river so they will not be obliged to spend too much time in their gardens. The past plowing for them and ourselves, although the past few days the ground is too dry to work properly.

Our new horse is salted so not much danger of him dying of horse sickness. We also got harness to drive in our trap so now we can drive to the village and take any vegetables we have for sale and bring back a bag of flour or a sack of salt or whatever we may need. The horse, harness and a cultivator which we have ordered will cost about \$110. We think it the Lord's plan that we have the second horse at present instead of the donkey as we had planned, and are trusting for the money to pay for him.

Last Sunday we had good meetings here at the station, and baptized two bright happy girls.

We hear that one of our seekers, a young man who went away to work, has finished believing and desires baptism when he returns. Thus the Lord is working through the hearts of many here who are hardened, and no wonder for the influence of the white men in general is against the work.

Keep praying that the Lord may break through all the opposition, and bring these needy souls to his feet.

We are trusting and praying that you may have victory in the home churches during the winter months. May the grace of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

We were also much helped by two visits of the members from Yarmouth Pent. Church, sharing their interest in the work of holiness. One young lady among those coming up on Sabbath from Yarmouth went forward in baptism. The closing services were truly a gracious time. We expect to establish a covenant meeting on Saturday 25th, and hold a business session, also to start a weekly prayer meeting which the church has not enjoyed for some years. Thus to God we give all the praise and glory.

We want to also note that shortly after our arrival home on Monday evening, our home was very pleasantly invaded by about 25 members of the church and congregation of Sandford and after an evening spent in music and song and social chat, with fruit and home made candy, the happy company took their departure, leaving their pastor and wife several dollars better off in cash and goods. Truly we appreciate those loving calls more than tongue or pen can express and our hearts go out in praise and gratitude to the Lord who has so graciously placed us among so kind and generous people, and pray God to fit us up that in the time to come we may be able to lead them on to victory in Jesus name.
