UNION.

During the past few weeks the question of organic union between the United Baptist and the Reformed Baptist has been spoken of. As was stated in our last issue a committee was received at the Alliance from the Baptist body, and Rev. H. S. Dow was appointed by the Alliance to convey to The Baptist Association at Hartland our kindly feelings towards them. Bro Dow was kindly received by that "Body" and invited to speak. In doing so, after bringing to them the greet ings of the Reformed Baptist Alliance of Canada, he speaking of the matter of union, said, that as a denomination we still held to the views on sanctification as we did in former years, and that after a lapse of over twenty years the younger men were as firm in their views on this subject as were their fathers. Rev. S. W. Sherman in seconding a vote of thanks given to the speaker said, he felt that the time would come when it would be realized that the difference between us was largely a difference of terms, rather than a difference of experience. No doubt the only road to union is through an unbiased study and exact intrepretation of New Testament terminology, together with a prayer and painstaking comparison by both sides of similar experiences differently named by each body.

We have no desire to enter into any year. controversy on this matter, further than to say that it was not a question of mere terms, but a difference of belief and experience, which causes the division between the people now known as the Reformed Baptist and those from whom they were expelled in 1888. -Mr. Sherman also refers to similar experiences differently named by each body. In reference to this we would say that when people receive the experience of Holiness as a second work of grace, they are united at once, and there need be no resolutions passed to make them one.
