THOU SHALT NOT KILL.

The above is recognized by all as one of the ten commandments given so long ago by God to man. And now after hundreds of years, it is still acknowledged to be as important as ever, and thus we have the observance of it urged upon us not only in the Bible, but the governments of all civilized countries unite in proclaiming to all their subjects, as well as to the stranger within their borders, this solemn declaration, "Thou shalt not kill."

And yet how often are we reminded that notwithstanding all that has been said by God, or government, and in the face of the extreme penalty attached to the breaking of this law, yet day by day, some who are looked upon as law abiding citizens, break through the restraints which should hold them back, and in a fit of jealous anger, or by a premeditated act take the life of a fellow citizen. These things are happening in this Christian Country, and in these quiet towns, and as we meet them we are horrified, and on every hand is heard expressions of surprise and regret. How could they do it? What a terrible thing? No one would have thought them ever guilty of such a terrible crime—why is it? And as we are thus pondering these matters, we think of the words of our Master recorded in Math. 15.19. For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornication and etc.—It is not then simply that some are more degraded than others, or that these having gone so far into sin, that they fail to recognize their duty to their fellow men, or to give heed to the laws of God or man, but the fact of the matter is, the trouble is all within and springs from the heart.

In Jer. 17.9 we read that the heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: Who can know it? How true, who can tell what will be the outcome of the sinful heart, or when, or in what form, this evil within may break out, and thus reveal to the world that persons true condition. The hands which were the instruments and did the deed were not to blame,

for back of those hands was the will fully under the control and power of that evil heart. What a picture here presented. What a lesson here taught to those, who are conscious that their heart is yet untouched by divine grace, is yet under the control and power of Satan.

And to think that those who are so good by nature, and who often have desires to lead a Christian life, may some day because of that evil heart within, be lead into some sin or crime, which will not only blacken their own life, but brings a blot upon the lives of their friends. You ask the reason, we answer sin did it. If this is true, then those who are conscious that their hearts are yet sinful, should at once come to God through Christ and by a confession of all the guilty past, and through the provision that was made on Calvary, receive the pardon of all their sins, and thus be freely justified in the sight of God. And then by a full surrender of all their ransomed powers to God, and by the application of the precious blood, be conscious that the carnal nature has been destroyed and the heart cleansed from all sin, made clean in His sight, and filled with all the fulness of God.—A.

WHOSOEVER HATETH HIS BROTHER IS A MURDERER.

1 John 3.15.

This verse although found in the Bible, and intended to convey to us a great truth, yet is not accepted very readily to-day by many people.

As a part of the scripture we are forced to admit that it is true, yet many are found all about us, who seem to question our interpretation of this passage.

We have become so familiar with the crime of murder, and the circumstances connected with the same, that we fail to see how one may be looked upon as guilty of such thing, and yet not commit the deed outwardly. But when we consider the matter in the light of New Testament truth, and in the spirit of the word, we see that in the sight of God, there are many who consciously and unconsciously are daily breaking the sixth commandment, and are as much guilty in the sight of their maker, as though they really committed the deed.

The Apostle in this chapter takes up the thought of loving one another, and to enforce it upon the minds of his readers he says "Not as Cain who was of that wicked one and slew his brother." And why did he do it. He was jealous of his brother, and hated him, and he rose up against him, and killed him. He would have us see here that it was hatred that really caused this brothers death. And using this as an illustration he would warn all people to beware of hatred in the heart.

This passage plainly teaches as well as other passages, that no child of God can have a spirit of hatred and retain the presence and spirit of God in the heart.

To have the spirit of hatred is to have the spirit of murder, and in the sight of God we stand condemned before him.—There is no use to try to excuse ourselves and smooth it over, the word of God is true. Beloved, let us examine ourselves, and see how we stand with our fellow men.—A.
