Dear HIGHWAY;—I am enjoying your pages very much and feel that you are doing a good work for the Master. It is the Will of God as revealed in His word that all those that are regenerated may and should be truly sanctified. Christ himself prayed to His Father, that his disciples might be sanctified. He knew they would be surrounded by the wicked world and needed power from above: Before his crucifixion they showed signs of weakness at one time disputing which should be the greatest; and again they all forsook him, and Peter who said he would never deny his Master, did deny him thrice, but after the day of Pentecost, when the prayer of his Master was answered, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, what different men they were, ready to do the will of God under all circumstances, could sing praises to God in the dark prison walls bound with fetters.

It makes a great difference in the heart of a believer to be really sanctified. Paul said that nothing could separate him from the love of God which was in Christ Jesus, and I feel glad that we as a denomination although few in numbers, comparatively speaking, feel it not only a duty but a privilege to declare to others the possibilities of grace through the plan of salvation. It might not be amiss to give to you some of the experiences through which I have passed, A good many years ago when quite young, I was converted, born again, and felt it my duty and privilege to unite with the Church of Christ. I enjoyed the presence of the Divine Master, as the years passed away, still it occurred to me that there was higher ground for me. As I read the Word of God especially those passages that relate to sanctification and holiness, and as I thought about them I was led to believe with all my heart that it was possible for me to be truly sanctified and when my faith took hold of the Divine promises, Heaven

ly light and love filled my soul and I could seem to realize as a matter of fact in my own experience the fulfillment of those promises. It was about this time that what was called the Holiness Movement was beginning to take hold of the minds of quite a number in the churches and I was glad to learn that others were being led in a similar way, and could testify to what the Lord had done for them, and so in the course of a short time quite a number of ministers and lay brothers and sisters felt it especially laid upon them to emphasize the matter of sanctification and holy living, and as we all know the outcome was the organization of the Reformed Baptist Denomination, and now I may here say that it does seem evident that the hand of God has been leading.

Now it is quite a number of years since the Lord led me into this way, and I have had quite an experience along the way, and am not tired of the way. Glory to God. And in these my declining days, of life, I feel it strongly impressed upon my mind the great importance of teaching and preaching entire sanctification and holiness. It is the first duty of man to give his whole heart to God, his creator, and it will give the greatest reward in this life, and in the life that is to come.

The Scriptures teach us that without Holiness no man shall see the Lord and without sanctification no man can be holy.

So then, dear brethren, let us not be weary in well doing, but strive in every way to impress upon the minds of those by whom we are surrounded the awful consequences of living in sin and how that Christ, the Saviour, has in the plan of salvation made it possible that we may be forgiven and cleansed from all sin and live in obedience to his holy commandments. I trust that the Lord will help us all to be faithful and true to Him and walk in the Light as He in the Light.
