Never in the history of the world have its inhabitants been so startled as on the morning of April 15th, when the message was flashed from place to place conveying the sad news that the S. S. Titanic the largest steamship afloat had struck an iceberg in mid-ocean, and sank carrying to their death over 1500 of her passengers and crew.

For days, in fact ever since, those who have been following up the details of the disaster have been paralyzed by the sad news. The whole world suddenly plunged into mourning, as nearly every country was represented in those who today are among the missing. To say the least we can only slightly realize what took place on that night, which will always remain in the minds of those who, were so fortunate to be among the survivors. While we may blame those in authority, and no doubt rightly so, yet in this sad occurrence there can be no doubt but that the world at large has received the greatest lesson in its history.

It is a lesson for all. It comes to the great steamship companies throughout the world; to the officers and those into whose care hundreds of lives are entrusted; to the rich man as well as the poor man to the one who is forgetful of God's holy day; in fact a lesson comes to us all. May we be ready to receive it and having received a lesson from God himself may we at once set to work to do as he would have us do. The words spoken by our Master so long ago, recorded in Matt. 24. 44.—"Therefore be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." As we think of those who were so near death that morning and who in the kindness of God were rescued, we say, what a message these words convey to them.

Yes, that is true, but even to us they should come with as much force and meaning, for while we may not be on the sea or in places which we may think perhaps are more dangerous than others, yet we know not what awaits us or how soon we may be called to face death and stand before God in judgment. How necessary then that we settle this question today. Am I ready to meet God? In order to be ready we must be born again; be made a new creature. And having come into the light we are to walk in the light, and do the whole will of God.

In seeking to know this will, we soon come to see our privilege in the gospel, "For this is the will of God even your sanctification" 1 Thess. 4.3.

A VERY SAD AND FATAL  
ACCIDENT.

While working with a wood cutter for Brother George Teddie on the 22nd inst, James E. Barker of Lower, Brighton met with an accident from which he died the following day. In some mysterious way his coat was caught by the shaft between the circular saw and the speed wheel, and in an instant his clothing was torn from his body, and his neck was drawn up against the shaft which such force that it caused internal hemorrhage, he regained consciousness up to within a few minutes of his death. Brother Barker had lived a strictly moral life, and about a year ago made a public profession of religion in special services conducted by Rev. L. Milton Williams in Woodstock. since that he has sustained regular family worship in his home, and gave testimony in his last moments that he was right with God. A wife and two children, mother, two brothers and three sisters survive him, and deeply mourn his sad and sudden death. The whole community were deeply stirred and manifested sincere sympathy with the stricken widow and her young children. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. A. Baker, assisted by Rev'ds A. H. Trafton, H. S. Dow, H. C. Archer and P. J. Trafton. Rev. B. Colpitts and Rev. Mr. Shurman were also present, and many friends from Woodstock and Hartland were among the large congregation who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. Brother Barker was 39 years of age.
