### SKILLED WORKMEN.

"That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." 2 Tim. 3-17. All christian denominations are calling out for more ministers to care for their churches. Not long since the writer heard a bishop deploring that poorly qualified men had to be employed; and leaders of other christian bodies sanctioned his statement. Since hearing those remarks we have thought much on the subject. Skilled labour is in demand in every department of the business world, and the demand is being met. Hundreds of thousands are preparing themselves to fill the positions in every department. But what about the highest of all callings. "The Man of God." This is more than a question of professional or mechanical skill. This preparation includes the school and the college, but the demand is for more than all schools and colleges of the church and world can convey to him. First; his is distinguished from all other callings for he is "The man of God." Second. The standard set for him is "perfection." Dr. Adam Clark says: "From what the apostle says here concerning the qualifications of a christian minister, we may well exclaim who is capable of these things? Is it such a person as has not intellect sufficient for a common trade or calling? No! A preacher of the gospel should be a man of the soundest sense, the most cultivated mind, the most extensive experience; one who is deeply taught of God and who has deeply studied man; one who has prayed much, read much, and studied much; one who takes up his work as from God, does it as before God, and refers all to the glory of God; one who abides under the inspiration of the Almighty, and who has hidden the word of God in his heart, that he might not sin against Him. No minister formed by man, can ever be such as is required here. The school of Christ, and that alone, can ever form such a preacher."

The standard is a high one and it ought to be as it is the most sacred office given to man, and it carries with it the most awful responsibility. There is no room for an indolent life. All who enter upon this divine calling should walk worthy of the vacation wherewith they are called. The imperative demand in this age is for an educated ministry, education has become general in country, village, town and city, many faithful men who entered the ministry in the generation now passing, who did not have the present educational privileges are finding themselves at a great disadvantage in these closing days of their ministry. How much more will the young men of the present generation who enter the ministry and neglect to fit themselves to stand shoulder to shoulder on the educational plain with the men and women to whom they are to minister. It is a sad state of things when people are mortified over the ignorance of the minister in their pulpit, and only tolerate him because he has the excellent qualities of being good, sincere and earnest. On the other hand, the man is as great, if not a greater disappointment and failure, yes he is a complete failure as a minister of Jesus Christ, who neglects the divine fitting, no matter how well fitted educationally, for he is not "The man of God," but the man of the school and college. "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few: Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." Luke 10-2.
