Special Notice to All Who Go to Beulah this Year

The steamer "Majestic" will leave on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday each week at 8.30 a. m.

From St. John, the steamer "D. J. Purdy" will leave Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 10 a. m.

The steamer "Champlain" will leave St. John on Tuesday and Thursday at 12 a. m. The Majestic will also leave St. John every Saturday at 5 p. m.

NOTE.—On all river boats except "May Queen" pay your fare to Beulah Camp which is 30 cts. from St. John, or \$1.25 from Fredericton and obtain a certificate of attendance from the Secretary at Camp Ground which will entitle you to a free return. You need not ask for certificates on boats.

NIGHT BOAT TO BEULAH.

At present there is only one day in the week viz. Saturday that a boat leaves St. John for Beulah Camp in the afternoon. The "Majestic" leaves that day at 5 p. m. But Capt. Taylor is building a boat, The "Oconee" 69 tons, which he hopes to have running on the river during the camp meeting, or after July 1st if possible. When completed she will leave St. John each day at 4.30 or 5 p. m. But at present only a night boat on Saturday.

RATES FOR TRAVELLING TO AND FROM THE ALLIANCE AND CAMP MEETING AT BEULAH, FROM JUNE 24th., TO JULY 17th., 1912.

VIA I. C. R.—Purchase one way first class Ticket to St. John, obtaining a STANDARD CERTIFICATE at the same time, which Certificate when signed by the Secretary at Beulah will entitle you to a free return.

VIA D. A. R.—Purchase a first class ticket to St. John, at the same time obtaining a STANDARD CERTIFICATE, which when signed by the Secretary will entitle you to a free return.

VIA C. P. R.—Purchase a first class ticket to St. Mary's or St. John, as you wish, obtaining at same time a STANDARD CERTIFICATE, which, when signed by the Secretary will entitle you to be returned at ONE THIRD first class fare.

ST. JOHN RIVER STEAMERS.—From Fredericton to Beulah on Steamer Majestic. From St. John to Beulah on Steamers "Majestic", "D. J. Purdy," and "Champlain."

Pay your fare to Beulah:—then ask the Secretary at Beulah for a Certificate, which will return you free.

GRAND MANAN STEAMER.—Pay fare to St. John, and get a Certificate from the Secretary at Beulah for a free return.

NOTICE.—BE SURE WHEN PURCHASING YOUR TICKET TO ASK FOR A "STANDARD CERTIFICATE" FROM ALL RAILWAY TICKET AGENTS, as only, by this being signed by the Secretary at the Camp Ground can you obtain a free return on the I. C. R. and D. A. R. and one-third return on the C. P. R.

Those coming from any point in the United States will buy a return ticket to the nearest station in New Brunswick on the C. P. R. and then buy a one way first class ticket from that station to St. Mary's or St. John, as you wish, at same time purchasing ticket, a Standard Certificate which when signed by the Secretary at the Camp Ground will entitle the holder to the ONE-THIRD return.

BE SURE to observe the above conditions as there will be no refund of fare.

The time on both Steamers and Railways is from Monday, June 24th., until Wednesday, July 17th.

OBITUARY.

On the morning of June 15th inst, at Wood Island, Grand Manan, there passed peacefully away to the "Better Land," our dear brother, Wm. Easton Green. He was justly considered one of the noblest men, and his departure is deeply mourned, not only by his immediate family and church, but by the entire community.

He was born at Wood Island, Oct. 6th, 1868. On April 15th, 1893, he was married to Miss Annie A. Harvey of Seal Cove, who proved to be a most excellent helpmate, and one who stood by him in every good word and work.

He was converted at a revival meeting held at Seal Cove in March, 1892, and was baptized by Rev. Sharp A. Baker, and united with the Reformed Baptist Church. In life and character he was one of the most beautiful and consistent Christians.

A few days before his death friends called to see him and held a prayer service, and he was asked what hymn he would like to have sung? He replied, "I would like to have sung:—
Far away in the depth of my spirit to-night,
Rolls a melody sweeter than psalm,
In celestial like strains it unceasingly falls
O'er my soul like an infinite calm.

He leaves not only a sorrowing wife who weeps with extreme sorrow, but a dear father and mother, two brothers and one sister. Brother and Sister Green had only one child and it was taken away in childhood; but his noble heart received three others into his home, and on these he bestowed a parent's tender care and affection.

The funeral services were conducted in the absence of his pastor, by Rev. W. Kenton Burr of the Christian Church. Subject, Immortality. Interment being in the little cemetery near the home in which he lived and died.

The church at Seal Cove of which he was a member, as a tribute of sympathy and appreciation, laid a pillow of flowers on his casket. Other friends also placed a floral cross and wreath and sprays as tokens of affection and esteem. Rev. W. K. BURR.
