REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON
SOCIAL REFORM.

It is evident to all who are familiar with social conditions as they exist today that secret sins are shockingly prevalent. It is much to be regretted that ministers of the gospel and others who profess an interest in the salvation of souls and the welfare of society, should be so ignorant and unconcerned about these destructive and deadly evils, which corrupt and destroy human lives and souls.

Every person interested in the cause of purity should be awake to the awful conditions now existing, and work with greatest zeal to make a change which shall glorify God and save mankind. In as much as young people often indulge in secret sins through ignorance, parents and others who regard the welfare of the youth should enlighten them as to the sad results of such indiscretions. The dance is a common indulgence, the effect of which is evil whenever and wherever practiced. It puts within the young a passion which makes it easy for Satan to lead them to more vicious sins. Christians and others who have a regard for decency do not dance. The theatre is another corrupting agency of the devil. In such places women perform before the public gaze wholly or partly divested of clothing, thereby tempting the indiscrete to vices untold. Even in what are called high class theatres the same is true, so that pure minded persons cannot and do not attend them. There is much obscene literature in the world which ought to be destroyed and banished forever from this earth. Doubtless the most common and annoying incentive to sins of impurity is the lack of proper dress on the part of women and girls, who by wearing dresses of transparent texture with low necks and short sleeves, attract toward themselves the lustful gaze of man and youth. In addition to this, pictures of these things are seen in almost every home as well as upon the streets and in other public places where they come before the vision of men and boys so that even the pure minded cannot keep from beholding these degrading sights. These deplorable facts cause great depravity among mankind. No woman or girl who has the proper knowledge and regard for decency will appear in public in immodest attire. All considerate persons will remove such pictures from their homes thus protecting their children.
