TWO SHORT VISITS.

The writer enjoyed a few days visit at Hartland to assist Pastor H. S. Dow in special services from Feb. 29th to March 4th, in which time we had the privilege of preaching five times, and teaching the Bible class Sunday p. m. We received a very cordial welcome by all the people we had the pleasure of meeting. We were very glad to find that not only the members of the church and congregation, but also the people generally esteem Brother Dow very highly. He is not only doing faithful work, but he is very diligent and fervent in his labours. We wish we had many more strong young men for the work that is before us in the propagation of scriptural holiness. We greatly enjoyed meeting those with whom we fought the battle of the Lord for three years on the Hartland circuit. Some of whom have been with us as co-labourers for nearly thirty years, and we have never known them to swerve to the right hand, nor to the left, but always found them at their post in the front rank and ready for every good word and work. How we thank God at every remembrance of them. Brother Dow is doing excellent work, and is rapidly developing into a wise and strong preacher of gospel truth and is having real success in spite of all that opposes or hinders the work of holiness. During our stay homes were opened to us most cordially among our own people and also by members of the other churches. We appreciate these expressions of christian fellowship very much.

After three days at home we started for Port Maitland, and Sandford N. S., to assist at the Quarterly Meeting being held at Port Maitland, where we arrived on the 9th in time for the evening service. The writer preached at 3 p. m. and at 7.30 p. m. The weather was quite unfavorable, but good congregations attended all the services.

While at Port Maitland we were very kindly entertained at the home of Brother Warren and Sister Sollows.

On Monday afternoon Brother Clarke came after us and drove us to his residence at Sandford, where he had the privilege of preaching to good congregations Monday and Tuesday evenings, and calling on Brother and Sister Bower and our aged Brother and Sister Thurston, also at the home of Brother Howard and Sister Thurston. We felt to be more than paid for our trip by having the pleasure of meeting the Brethren and Sisters of the churches of this circuit, and especially those with whom we have been acquainted since the early days of the holiness movement in these provinces.

DEATHS.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary Ann Smith, who died in Bangor on the 6th inst, and whose remains were brought here by her daughter, Mrs. Victoria Peltier for burial, took place on Saturday last at the Reformed Baptist church, at Lower Southampton. The large attendance of old friends and relatives showed the high esteem in which she was held, the deceased having been a resident of that place from her childhood until she went to Bangor to live with her daughter about seven years ago. Thomas Stairs, a nephew of the deceased, directed the funeral, while four other nephews acted as pall bearers. The sermon was preached from Phil 3: 20-21 by Rev. A. E. Stairs. Rev. Mr. Quigg assisting in the service.

Mrs. Smith was in the 85th year of her age and leaves two daughters, Mrs. R. D. Scott of Smith's Falls, Ont, and Mrs. Victoria Peltier of Bangor, Me., who so tenderly administered to the comfort of her mother in her last days; one sister, Mrs. Octavia Getchell of Orono, Me., who also accompanied the remains; three brothers, Gideon, Botsford and John Stairs of this place besides a large number of other relatives. Mrs. Smith, at the time of her death, was a member of the Reformed Baptist church, having professed religion at the age of thirteen, and afterwards baptized by Rev. Samuel Hartt. During her sojourn among us here as a Christian she left many impressions for good, by her earnest appeals and her soul-stirring exhortations, her conversation being on Heaven, from whence she looked for the appearing of her Lord, who will change her vile body that it may be fashioned like unto His own glorious Body.

The remains were interred in the family cemetery near the old home of her childhood.—Woodstock Press.

DEATHS.

The death took place at her home at Meductic, N. B., on March 21st, of Carrie, beloved wife of Abram Marsten, aged 70 years, leaving to mourn their loss, a husband, two adopted daughters, Katheleen at home, and Mrs. Arthur Everett of Woodstock, and one sister, Miss M. McIndoe who resided with the deceased.

Mrs. Marsten professed religion when young and united with the Methodist church at Woodstock, but later became a member of the Reformed Baptist Church at that place. She had been in failing health for more than a year and during the past few months had failed very fast. She bore her sufferings with christian fortitude and as the end drew near she was ready to go. The funeral service was held at the church at Meductic Saturday and was conducted by Rev. G. B. McDonald of Andover assisted by Rev's Mr. Donville and Sabine. Interment took place at Woodstock.

Thos. D. McGee of Boston, Mass., a son of the late Joseph McGee of Hartland, N. B., and a brother of Mrs. Frank Kimball of this town, died very suddenly Friday afternoon at the home of her sister, his death having been caused by heart failure. Mr. McGee has been in poor health for a number of months, and had come here for the purpose of getting where there was lots of good fresh air, in the hopes that he might be benefited thereby. He was apparently however about the same as usual Friday morning and his death was sudden and unexpected. The body of the deceased was taken to Hartland, N. B., for interment, prayers being said at the house, the service being conducted by Rev. M. S. Trafton. Mr. McGee leaves a wife and four children in Boston, his wife being unable to be present at the funeral. He also leaves a sister Mrs. Frank Kimball, another sister in Boston, Mrs. Aric Nelson, a brother Frank McGee of this town, who accompanied the remains to Hartland Saturday, and a brother in Butte, Montana. The relatives have the sympathy of friends.—Fort Fairfield Review.

SUDDEN DEATH AT GRAND MANAN.
