IN MEMORIAM.

In loving remembrance of George H. Arnold, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Arnold, of Woodstock, N. B., who departed this life April 26th, 1912, in full assurance of faith for eternal

It is with mingled feelings of sadness and joy that we write concerning the decease of our brother. Sadness at his departure so soon, as he was only in his 44th year, and left a sorrowing wife and two daughters who greatly needed his assistance, as Sister Arnold is in delicate health and the youngest daughter but a babe. But glad to learn that he had the witness that his salvation was sure, and his joy abounded and all was well between his soul and God, and he rested in God's will. Bro. Arnold was converted a number

of years ago through the influence of the Salvation Army and endeavoured to lead a christian life. On removing from Woodstock to Hyde Park, Mass., and while engaged in his usual occupation of moulder, he was stricken with a most serious form of Bright's disease in February 1902, and was advised by his physicians to return to Woodstock, his former home. On coming there the best of physicians were consulted who held out no hope of his recovery. In fact a consultation of nearly all the physicians of the town was held in August of that year and they decided that his case was hopeless and incurable His near friends suggested prayer on his behalf and called in a number of those who believed that God could do what earthly physicians said was hopeless. The result was that God heard prayer and blessed remedies for his recovery and he was restored to his usual health; and said after three years from that time that 'he never felt bet-The first Camp Meeting of the season ter in his life.' In 1903 he united with the Reformed Baptist church of Woodstock, on receiving baptism by the pastor, the writer of this memorial; and in his testimonies often referred to the fact of his recovery, and his thankfulness to God therefore. A short time previous to his death, he was stricken again with an acute and fatal form of kidney disease, and though much prayer was offered for his recovery yet it seemed to be God's will that he should depart to a better land where the "inhabitants shall not say I am sick."

Bro. Arnold was a very kind and loving husband and father, and will be greatly missed not only by his family and his father, mother, brother and two sisters, and relatives, but by his friends and the citizens of the town and country as he was well known, and his voice was often heard in sacred song among them. The writer mourns with the others in the loss of a very kind friend. The funeral service was held at his home in Woodstock on Sunday afternoon. The writer officiated, assisted by Rev. H. C. Archer and Rev. B. Colpitts.
