Mrs. James H. Olts was born May 11th, 1852, in Canterbury, York Co., N. B., and died at the home of her step-son, Mr. C. O. P. Olts in the city of Vancouver, B. C., on Jan. 11th, 1902, from paralysis about 13 days after she was first stricken down.

On January 13th, her body was laid to rest in the Mountain View Cemetery Vancouver, there to await the resurrection of the just.

Her husband mourns the loss of a loving and faithful wife. She also leaves three children, all of whom are married, one a daughter in Maine, and one daughter and one son in N. B., to mourn the loss of an affectionate mother. Those of her loved ones and friends who were present during her illness, and at her death bed, felt they could not sorrow as others, who have no hope. During the night previous to her being taken ill, her husband was awakened by hearing her rejoicing in her Saviour's love and praising Jesus for a victory that he had given her the grace to win. She seemed to suffer very little if any during her illness, and at the last without any apparent pain she peacefully fell asleep in Jesus, and her spirit went to be with God who gave it. It was about a year or a little more since Sister Olts was restored to the love and favor of God at the Apostolic Faith Mission, Vancouver, since which time she has been growing in grace, and in the knowledge of her Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and had been apparently ripening for the world to come.
