

cordance with the requirements of the country and its proceedings be regulated by some defined and well-understood rule of law.

At the annual meeting of the subscribers to the Frederickton Reading and News Room, held on Tuesday the 1st Dec. 1840.

The Hon. the Solicitor General was called to the Chair, and Mr. Gowan was appointed Secretary to the Meeting. Mr. Gregory reported that the Committee appointed on 5th October last, had attended to the duty then delegated to them, and had ascertained that 106 persons would subscribe for the ensuing year. Mr. Scott, Chairman of the Committee of Management for the past year then submitted their Annual Report.

The Treasurer's annual accounts were then presented, and audited by a committee appointed for that purpose.

From the report and accounts it appeared, that sundry valuable Standard Literary Works had been procured during the year, and the literary works and furniture belonging to the Institution cost upwards of £90.

It was then resolved, that the institution be henceforward under the control of an Honorary Manager, to be assisted by a Committee of reference consisting of three members; all of whom, with the Honorary Manager shall be chosen annually at the meeting in December, or at any meeting to be summoned specially for that purpose; and they shall continue in office until others are appointed in their stead. Their duties being the same as originally prescribed at the formation of the Institution.

Mr. Street having occasion to leave the meeting, Benjamin Wolhaupter, Esq. was called to the Chair, and on motion of Doctor Allan, the thanks of the meeting were then presented to the honorable the Solicitor General for his conduct in the Chair.

Mr. Miller reported, that the Committee appointed for that purpose had ascertained, that of the fourteen unpaid subscriptions at least six would pay, when again demanded, and that several of the remainder had removed from Frederickton or had by unforeseen misfortune become unable to pay.

Therefore Resolved, that the persons who have subscribed to the list for last year and have not yet paid, be not permitted to become members of this Institution, until they shall have paid up the whole amount already subscribed by them respectively.

Resolved that any person wishing to become a subscriber to this Institution in the course of the current year, shall be entered as a member upon paying to the manager at the following rates viz:

Subscribing between 1st Dec. and 1st June twenty-five shillings; 1st June and 1st Sept. fifteen shillings; 1st Sept. and 1st Dec. seven shillings and six-pence.

Resolved that the thanks of the subscribers be presented to the Committee of Management of last year for their services.

Mr. Scott was unanimously and by acclamation appointed Honorary Manager of the Institution for the ensuing year, and Messrs. Inches, Gowan, and Botsford were chosen as the Committee of Reference.

Resolved unanimously, That the honorary manager of this institution be exempted from the payment of any annual subscription.

Resolved, That the thanks of the subscribers are again due to H. K. Smithers, Junior, Esq. of London for his valuable and indispensable services, in continuing to procure and forward the Reviews, Magazines, and Newspapers from London, Edinburgh and Dublin; and ordered that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to Mr. Smithers by letter from the honorary manager.

Mr. Wolhaupter was then requested to leave the Chair, which was taken by Mr. Scott; when on motion, the thanks of the meeting were presented to Mr. Wolhaupter for his conduct in the chair, and also to Mr. Gowan for his services as Secretary. And the meeting then dissolved.
