

We also observe that strenuous efforts are making by the Bishop of Nova Scotia to obtain additional funds, and to increase the church missionaries in this and the neighbouring colonies of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, without the shadow of their producing any commensurate or beneficial results. In the towns, and wherever a number of churchmen have set themselves down, a clergyman of the established church might and ought to exercise a beneficial influence; but generally throughout these Provinces, the protestant portion of the population are dissenters: chiefly belonging to the secession church of Scotland, the Wesleyan Methodists and the Baptists: the latter of which are most numerous, both in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia; and we think we need not tell our readers, that among persons of either of these denominations, the exertions of a clergyman of the church of England, would be perfectly nugatory and worse than useless.

We believe the Bishop himself labours under a gross delusion upon this subject.—He visits various parts of his extensive diocese upon stated occasions, when a general muster takes place, and crowded congregations are drawn together,—a large proportion of motives of curiosity, and to hear one of the most accomplished preachers of his day; but after his departure the churches are again but thinly attended, and the people resort to other places to listen to sermons more in accordance with their religious opinions, as respects doctrinal points; and delivered by men who better understand their dispositions. We entertain no hostility against the establishment, are attached to its services, and as gentlemen respect its ministers; but from personal knowledge of these Provinces, and the sentiments of their inhabitants, we cannot lend the sanction of a Public Journal, to the perpetuation of error or misapprehension; or witness their circulation without exposing them.

We mentioned last week that a letter from Sheffield, which was put on board one of the steamboats in the river, never came to hand; and we find that another sent from St. John with a communication on public affairs, has also been intercepted. One of the letters intended to expose the *Chronicle*, written by the Skinner family, was stopped in the same manner; and in that way the conductors of that print, escaped an exposure and castigation which they richly merited.

It is much to be regretted that there is not a mail forwarded by the boats, at a cheap rate of postage—say a penny a single letter. The number of these which pass daily is immense, and the sum that might in this way be obtained, would pay for the hire of a clerk. No person would hesitate to avail himself of such a means of conveyance, and the frauds of which we hear frequent complaint, would in this way be prevented. With respect to those gentry however who intercept letters, they must understand that they can only be considered as common thieves; and when detected, should be dealt with as such.

The last number of the Halifax *Acadian Recorder*, alludes to a paragraph inserted in the Gazette of the preceding Wednesday, which states that a despatch has been received, adverse to the application of the Assembly for the recall of Sir COLIN CAMPBELL, and the reconstruction of the Executive Council. We shall hear more upon this subject anon; and meantime feel satisfied it can never be the intention of the Queen's ministers, to continue an officer in charge of the Government of Nova Scotia—or any other Province—who expressly and deliberately violates the commands which he receives; nor can His Excellency remain there, with the most distant hope of acting in concert with any House of Assembly, that may be chosen to represent the wishes of the people. Whatever may have been the decision of the Colonial Secretary with reference to the address of the Assembly, the principles laid down in his red-tape despatch, of which that body with much tact availed themselves; and he must also be prepared to remove any stumbling block, that he may find in his way, England is no longer going to pay for a standing army to support misrule in the colonies.

Since writing the above, the Halifax *Times* has come to hand, and contains the article alluded to, copied from the Gazette; which does not affect the question at issue between the parties in Nova Scotia. It will be perceived that the Address in question has not been laid before the Queen, because it was not transmitted through the Lieut. Governor, which course is positively enjoined, with reference to all documents of that nature; and Sir Colin's refusal to re-construct the Council, without receiving Her Majesty's commands, to that effect is approved of; but the dispatch alluded to, does not seem to convey the most distant approval of the line of policy which His Excellency thought proper to pursue, or to sanction his violation of instructions in the selection of members to fill vacancies in that body.

Her Majesty's government have agreed to relinquish the custody of the remains of the Emperor Napoleon; and a frigate under the command of the Prince de Joinville is to be despatched to St. Helena for the purpose of receiving them on board, in which they are to be conveyed to France, and interred with the ceremony due to his greatness and renown.

We feel much pleasure in giving insertion to the communication from Dorchester, describing the Temperance Festival in that place; which seems to have been conducted with much spirit, and must have given very general satisfaction.

On our last page, will be found an article copied from an American paper, which goes forcibly to show the importance of the Madawaska territory in a military point of view; and demonstrates the absurdity of Great Britain abandoning her just right to the country; even were she not bound to retain it from higher considerations, with reference to a population, which have always enjoyed the wholesome and protecting influence of her laws, and the distinguished privilege of being British subjects.

INSPECTION OF THE 36TH REGT. The usual half-yearly inspection of this distinguished corps, took place yesterday forenoon in the Barrack square; and in the afternoon, the regiment was drawn up on the flats below the town, to receive His Excellency the Lieut. Governor; they then went through the manual and platoon exercises, and subsequently performed a variety of military evolutions, in the most rapid and dashing style, evidently much to the satisfaction of the Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, and their indefatigable commanding officer Lt. Col. Maxwell. The regiment then formed in line, advanced in the usual manner, the band playing and saluted His Excellency; who then quitted the ground attended by his staff. We shall in our next give a more detailed account of the day's proceedings, which at this late hour we are compelled to omit.
