

laying on of hands;" and it was explanatory of the origin, authenticity and object of the rite of confirmation; and was intended to prepare his parishioners for the expected arrival of the Lord Bishop of the diocese.

After service we rode to the Hammond River Ferry, with the family of a gentleman returning from church, partook of refreshment at the Temperance House, already referred to in the commencement of this account of our tour; and afterwards walked to within seven miles of St. John, where we put up at a tavern owned by the Hon. William Black. It is much to be regretted that there is no tea-house nor gardens on this road, whither the citizens could resort, and where the traveller could obtain a quiet night's rest.

Before leaving the house in the morning, we had some conversation with our host, and satisfied him that in retailing ardent spirits, he is neither consulting his own interests, nor the respectability and comfort of his family; and he has promised to abandon that line of life, upon which we believe he reluctantly consented to enter; and to return to those rural pursuits, that are more congenial to a man's welfare, and the happiness of the domestic circle.

We reached St. John before breakfast on Monday, having been overtaken by a gentleman who was driving to town in his wagon, and with whom we rode part of the distance; went on board the Meteor in the evening, was run into by the Fredericton during the night, by which we were detained on the river about one hour, and arrived home early on the following morning; having travelled during the last twenty days upwards of 450 miles; a considerable portion of that distance on foot.

On Monday night about 12 o'clock, the Fredericton and Meteor steamboats came in contact with each other at the head of Long Island, by which the latter vessel had her larboard wheel and quarter boards stove in; and a passenger who was sleeping near was seriously injured. This occurrence which by the passengers and crew of the Meteor was at first supposed to be intentional, originated in the misconception of a badly worded handbill, by which the course was altered that had been pursued before, and which generally prevails;—the master of one vessel considering that under the arrangement made by the owners, he was to pass on the right side of the approaching vessel, and the master of the other, that he was to keep the right hand shore aboard.

It is high time that some positive enactment were made on the subject; as the lives of passengers ought not to be jeopardised in the manner which at present prevails, and which unless altered, will terminate in something serious. It happened fortunately, that there were about a dozen shipwrights on board the Meteor; and after an hour's delay she was enabled to proceed on her voyage.

The last New York Albion contains the article in the Westminster Review, from the pen of Mr. Buller, on the Northeastern Boundary. In our last we inserted a communication written by a gentleman who is well acquainted with the subject, and who we trust will follow it up. Mr. Buller evidently labours under the mistake that the treaty of 1783 recognised the former northwest angle of Nova Scotia; whereas it was evidently the intention of the Commissioners to establish another, by which the entire portion of the British Provinces would be secured, whose inhabitants had remained true to their sovereign. It is where a line drawn due north from the source of the St. Croix strikes the highlands that angle should be placed, and nowhere else. Any attempt to mix up the former angle of Nova Scotia in the controversy must produce confusion, and can only prevent a just and proper settlement of the question.

We are glad to find that travelling on the river St. John, has increased during the present month to a considerable extent; and that the New Brunswick during her last two trips, brought up each time, upwards of a hundred passengers. We perfectly agree in the compliment paid by our correspondent, to the contractors for erecting the Bridge over the Oromocto; and as the building of the Approaches is about to be contracted for, we hope the same parties will have the completing of the work. The Commissioners should exercise a discretionary power in those affairs; and altho' a tender may be higher, reference should be had to the party tendering, as to his ability to complete the work in a manner satisfactory to the public. Their office is an invidious one; and altho' as a Public Journalist, we felt bound on a former occasion, to insert a communication reflecting upon the proceedings of those gentlemen; yet we feel assured, that in selecting a site for the Bridge, and in having it erected in a permanent manner, they have faithfully discharged the trust which was reposed in them.

We feel much pleasure in stating, that the dry weather which has hitherto prevailed in the Northern and Eastern parts of the Province, has been succeeded by copious and refreshing showers; which commenced falling on Wednesday week at Dorchester and in that neighbourhood; by which the crop of grass in particular has been greatly benefited, as well as the potatoes and grain.

While Nature appears disposed to gladden the hearts of the husbandman, Providence is no less bountiful during the present season, to those who obtain the means of sustenance from the deep. The Bay of Fundy we understand, abounds with Fish of various descriptions; and the Salmon fishery has been unusually plentiful. The only class of persons who seem to suffer, are those who risk their welfare upon the precarious pursuits of lumbering.

On our first page, will be found an article relating to the Methodist Conference of considerable interest. Large sums of money are collected in these Provinces by its members, which go to swell the funds of the Body in England; and we were not aware till lately, of the small amount that is paid in return, to the Missionaries employed on foreign stations, and who are obliged to call upon their congregations to increase their contributions.

Melancholy Accident.—On Tuesday, the 23d ult. James, son of Mr. Thos. B. Moore, of Dorchester, was discovered by W. P. SLYRE, Esq. floating upon the water in Mr. ROSS's mill pond. He was immediately taken up; but, notwithstanding every exertion to restore animation, life was extinct. It was supposed that he had fallen from a steep bank by the side of the pond; and in this way came by his death.

We understand from the Agent at Bathurst, that our subscribers there complain of the Postage on Newspapers. That is an affair they must settle with the Post office department. It is expected pursuant to permission from home; and the Postmaster calls upon us half-yearly for the amount. We shall be in Bathurst during the week after next, and will expect payment in full of our accounts in that place, as well as elsewhere on the road to that place.

The Governor General has arrived at Halifax and assumed the Government of that Province. His Excellency Sir JOHN HARVEY proceeded thither on Tuesday last, in the Steamer Maid of the Mist, where the Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island had already arrived, and the Lt. Governor of Newfoundland was daily expected. It is reported that His Excellency may be expected to visit this Province; and preparations are making in St. John to receive him.

We detained the paper till the arrival of the Halifax mail in the hope that the steamer would have arrived; but she had not reached that place on Wednesday.

St JOHN, July 14.
The Boston Transcript says that a "complimentary Dinner is to be given by our citizens to the Hon. Samuel Cunard, on the arrival of the steamer Britannia. This has been resolved upon by general acclamation. All classes of our community take a deep interest in the matter; and exertions, we are assured, will not be wanting to give Mr. Cunard and the noble steam packet a most hearty and cordial welcome."

We learn that His Excellency the Governor General is expected to visit this Province previous to his return to Canada.

His Excellency Sir John Harvey and Suite, Colonel Maxwell, 39th Regt. Major Brooke's 69th Regt. and the Officers of the Garrison, attended the Theatre last evening. The play was Otway's Tragedy of Venice Preserved; Mr. Vandennoff performing the part of Pierre; Mr. Fredericks that of Jaffier; and Miss Vandennoff as Belvidera, His Excellency, we learn, expressed himself highly pleased with the able manner in which all these several parts were sustained, but more particularly the performance of Mr. and Miss Vandennoff. On entering the Theatre His Excellency was received with three hearty cheers the musicians playing the National Anthem, and the audience, which was highly respectable, rising from their seats.

Vice Admiral Sir Thomas Harvey will proceed to Quebec in the Course of next month, in the Winchester.
