

United States, and we understand speaks highly of the courtesy and attention which were shown him by the citizens of that country, and particularly with reference to the command which he held on the frontier during the late disturbance caused by the inroad from the State of Maine.

The gallant Colonel, we regret to learn, is about quitting the garrison on leave of absence; we trust only for a short period.

The question of peace or war in Europe is still suspended in a balance; the probability however is that the former will predominate, and that the promptitude and energy displayed by the Powers of Europe, with reference to the affairs of Ali Pacha, will have a beneficial effect.

Meantime France itself is any thing but prepared for a Foreign war, unless indeed it is necessary to give another direction to the domestic discord that prevails in that kingdom; and to which the bringing back the remains of the Emperor Napoleon may give a fresh impetus.

In England the crops had been plentiful; and were secured sufficiently, to preclude any apprehension of their being seriously injured by the weather. The price of grain therefore continued to decline in the market.

In this Province we are happy to say, the smiles of Providence have been equally propitious; the potato crop, which at one time it was apprehended, would have been seriously injured by the dry weather, having been greatly benefited by the latter rain; and consequently every where they have turned out better than it was expected.

The following letter from our correspondent at Bathurst, shows the state of agricultural affairs in that distant portion of the Province; and we believe will form a proper criterion to judge of their productiveness elsewhere.

"The crops this season have been very productive, the potato crop was never better; and it is estimated that this year's produce exceeds that of last year barely in this township, by two thousand barrels. In the neighboring settlement at New Brandon, potatoes appear in as great verdure now as they did months ago; as the weather has been particularly favorable."

We find on our table this morning a small volume of "Poems by a Wesleyan Minister," which is every way worthy of public patronage. One of these is entitled "The Deliverance of the Israelites at the Red Sea;"—the other is "Poema Historialis;" and has reference to the former glory of ancient Babylon. We shall take occasion again to allude to this work; and therefore will only mention at present, that it may be had at the Stores of Messrs, Beak and Chestnut.

We observe that a contract has been advertised, for a steamboat to carry the mails between Annapolis and St. John; and tenders were to have been received in London on the 19th September. It would have been desirable that the contract were taken here; but a small boat adequate to the purpose, will doubtless be obtained in England and the passage-money, which is at present too high, will we hope be reduced.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17.
Upon the arrival of the *Acadia*, on Thursday evening, the Nova Scotia Philanthropic Society assembled at Dalhousie College and proceeded to Cunard's Wharf, headed by the President, Hon. J. L. Starr, and Officers of the Society, to present a costly set of elegant colors to that vessel, which had been procured by a subscription of the members of the Society. They were received by the Hon. Mr. Cunard, who expressed much satisfaction at receiving such a flattering testimonial of his fellow townsmen's regard.

In Spain the internal troubles of the country seem advancing to a conclusion. Espartero has received and accepted the task of forming a ministry, and having consulted the municipal juntas of Madrid and Saragossa, he is said to have nominated a ministry in which the country generally has confidence. The Duke of Victoria has dissolved the national guard of Barcelona, in order to its reconstruction. The Madrid Gazette properly ridicules the French papers, which represent the late revolution in Spain to be the result of English influence. The towns and the army are continually declaring their adhesion to the Madrid Government.

We observe that the Editor of the *Miramichi Gleaner* is about to introduce the Cash system into this Province, with reference to subscriptions to Newspapers and advertising; and hope his example will be generally followed.

As respects *The Sentinel*; we shall expect in future, that when it is ordered or subscribed for the advance be paid; and unless the year's subscription is paid when it becomes due, the paper will be stopped. Those persons in the vicinity of Fredericton, who wish to pay in produce, must send the same to this office, before the last of this month; as, with the exception of Wood or Oats, all payments after the 30th November must be in cash.
