" The only topic which it remains to notice, as affecting the two Canadian Provinces alike, is that of raising an emigrant fund from the proceeds of the sales of the crown lands. Unfortunately, the very elaborate Report communicated to me by Lord Durham on this subject, serves but to confirm, and to place in a still clearer light, the difficulties by which as we were previously aware, the promotion of this most important object is obstructed. Such is the extent of land alienated, and so inconsiderable the proportion which still remains vested in the grown. portion which still remains vested in the crown, that the hope of rendering any effectual aid to emigration by the sale of such lands, cannot at present be reasonably entertained. The necessary preliminary to the introduction of any such system, would be the resumption of large tracts of land held by grantees in a barren and unprofitable state.
