

the East; while the moral effect upon other nations, will not be without its benefit.

The position of Great Britain at the present moment, is one which every Englishman must contemplate with pride and exultation; and while engaged in wars in another hemisphere, and conducting them successfully, she is at the same time prepared in the West, to resist aggression from whatever quarter it may proceed.

The Gazette of last Wednesday contains a notice from the Crown Land Office, calling upon parties who are indebted to make payment pursuant to resolutions of the Assembly, under the following provisions. They are divided into three classes.—The first class consists of those persons owing balances for Crown Lands over 300 acres, who have taken out their grants, and who are required to make payment by the 10th September next; in failure of which legal proceedings are to be instituted for the recovery of the sums due. The second class consists of those who purchased over 300 acres, and have paid one or more instalments, without taking out their grants; and they are required to make payment of the balance by the above time.—Failing to do so, the sums paid become forfeited, the lands to revert to the crown, and bonds and other securities become cancelled. But where timber and logs have been cut, they are to be relieved only upon the payment of the duties accruing. The third class consists of persons who owe balances for land, under 300 acres, who are called upon to pay; but no coercive measures are to be adopted, if they are unable to pay, and the period of payment may be extended by the Executive government, should it think proper. An inquest was held at the Parish of Andover County of Carleton, the 10th inst. before J. P. Taylor, Esq. Coroner, on view of the body of WILLIAM QUIRK, the Jury after a long and patient investigation, returned a verdict that the deceased Wm. Quirk came to his death, in consequence of injuries received in different parts of his body, in a way unknown to the Jury.

We are requested to state that a meeting will be held at Douglas, near the Methodist Meeting House, on Monday 3d May, for the purpose of forming an Agricultural Society, which persons favourable to so important an object are requested to attend.

We omitted to state in our last that the ice started on the preceding Sunday; and during the week the river became sufficiently clear to enable the Meteor steambot to reach Fredericton on Saturday last; since which the Boats have been running regularly.

It will be seen that the 76th Regiment are to proceed to Bermuda.—They are at Demerara we believe; and we understand a sloop of war has been despatched for their conveyance thither. Within the last twenty years, the fortifications at Bermuda have been greatly strengthened. That Island may be considered as the key of America, and is a position, from which it is in the power of a maritime nation to attack unexpectedly any point on the whole line of the American sea-board, from the nearest part of which it is distant only about 400 miles.

There is already a regiment there, another is about to be added; and with a third, and a small steamer to transport them from one part of the Island to another, the Bermudas aided by their natural and artificial defences, may be considered as impregnable.

Boundary Question.—In the British House of Commons, March 9th, Lord John Russell in the course of some remarks upon the estimates of the army, said:

"The whole difficulty with respect to the boundary question in America was the failure of his noble friend and the Government to make a reply to the ultimatum sent from the United States. His noble friend, in the course of last year, had transmitted a project for the purpose of finally settling this question with the American Government. After the lapse of a considerable period the American Government sent back a different one, called a counterproject, with various provisions of their own. At the same time that these provisions reached this country, there at the same time arrived gentlemen who had been ordered to make a survey of the part of the country in which the disputed boundary existed. These gentlemen were now employed in making a report of their survey, and as soon as their report was received, an answer would be given to the counter-project of the American Government. That was the state of things at present, which would show him attention in making an answer to the ultimatum, as the hon. member called it, of the American Government. There was another question—namely, of claims made by citizens of this country of Maine to parts said to belong to the state, which had led to proceedings between the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and the authorities of the state of Maine. That had led to some correspondence which had appeared, and it had led to necessity of protecting the road and the shores by which our troops moved from New Brunswick to Canada, and which it was necessary to provide against, as gangs of persons roved about on parts held not to belong to either party. He would not go now into the general statement which his right hon. friend the Secretary of War would presently make, and he thought that (Mr. Macaulay, would show that they were not liable to be charged with asking for too great an estimate if they were to retain the means which were necessary for preserving the great empire in its state of safety, and at the same time of resisting aggressions, from whatever part they might come."

We understand that New York papers of Sat-

urday last, were received at St. John on Monday, by the steamer North America.

On Saturday last the 36th Regt with the Royal Artillery, under the command of Lieut. Col. Maxwell, formed near the church. At 12 o'clock His Excellency the Lieut. Governor arrived on the Ground, and was received in the usual manner; a royal salute was then fired from the field pieces: and the troops gave three cheers,—which were returned by the spectators—in honor of the Queen's marriage. After the regiment had left the ground, His Excellency stated that he should appoint the 23d May, being Her Majesty's birth day, for the celebration of the happy event, to be observed throughout the Province.

The Commemoration of the Birth and Marriage of the Queen.

On Friday the 24th inst. a meeting of the Inhabitants of Fredericton and its vicinity, was held at the County Court House, for the purpose of carrying into effect the proposal of His Excellency the Lieut. Governor,—that Saturday the 23d of May next, should be set apart as a day of Rejoicing throughout the Province, to commemorate the Birth and Marriage of our Most Gracious Queen.

The Hon. JOHN S. SAUNDERS in the chair. The Hon. W. F. Odell, His Honor the Master of the Rolls, and several other gentlemen having addressed the meeting; It was resolved on the motion of the Hon. Geo. F. Street the Solicitor General, that a Committee be appointed to collect funds, for the purpose of providing some amusement and refreshment, for the poorer classes of the inhabitants of Fredericton and its vicinity, on the 23d day of May next; in celebration of the Birth and Marriage of our Most Gracious Queen; and that the Committee be empowered to send refreshments to the houses of any poor families, to whom they may have the means of extending relief.

The following persons were named members of the Committee:—

The Hon. Lieut. Col. Shore, Geo. F. Street, and John S. Saunders. Lieut. Col. Hayne, Lt. Col. Allan, Major L. A. Wilmot, Messrs. James Taylor, Charles Fisher, W. H. Odell, Stephen Miller, Geo. Garden, Geo. Lee, Jun. Benjamin Wolhaupter, John T. Smith, John A. Beckwith, George Minchin, jun. Dr. Fraser, M. Needham, James Beek, S. Barker, George Munro, William Berton, J. F. Gale, and John Gregory.

When it was further resolved, that it be left to the Committee to make such arrangements for the amusements of the day (and on the motion of the Venerable the Archdeacon) for the extending relief to poor families at their homes, as might be most calculated to carry into effect the intentions of the gentlemen who composed the meeting.

The Chairman having left the chair; on the motion of the Solicitor General, Col. Minchin was called to the chair; when the thanks of the meeting were given to the Hon. John S. Saunders, for his conduct as chairman.
