The Chinese Empire .- China proper consists of eighteen rich and fertile Provinces, each of which is equal in extent and population to some European kingdoms, making an aggregate of 1,298,000 square miles. To this may added Chinese Tartary, a thinly peopled but out-stretched region. Her power is strengthened by having Thibet on the one hand, and Co rea or Loo Choo on the other, almost entirely subject to her influence. Again, Cochin China, Burmah, and Siam, are claimed among her tri-butary kingdoms. Her overgrown dominions thus extend over thirty-five degrees of latitude and seventy of longitude, and cover an area of 3,000,000 square miles.
