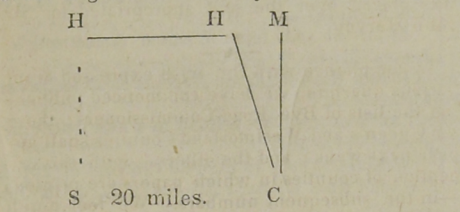


The question as we have already observed, will again in all probability be referred to arbitration: and Her Majesty's government will now bring with them to the consideration of the subject, a perfect understanding of those ranges of highlands, which are to be found between the River St. Lawrence, and the Gulf of the same name and the Atlantic ocean. They will also have learnt, and we trust the point will not be lost sight of in any future arbitration, how easy it will be to fulfil the terms of the treaty of 1783, provided the head of the true river St. Croix is taken for a starting point, — or even the Western and main branch of the Scouadic, or St. Croix so regarded by the Commissioners who established the monument at the source of the Chepuitnick, which empties into that river from the northward.

In fact, it was owing to the bungling, not to say treachery of those Commissioners, — that any difficulty has occurred; for had they taken the main branch of the river, and pursued it to its source; a due north line would have struck the highlands trending from the head of Connecticut river, at a distance of probably not more than twenty miles. The American government aware of this fact, in a most disinterested manner, not long since proposed, that the line instead of being run due north from the monument; should diverge westerly till it strike the highlands in question; and thence extend to the head of Connecticut river, as described in the original treaty; dividing the rivers that flow through the American territory into the Atlantic, from those which head them, and empty themselves into the River St. Lawrence.

The following diagram, will convey to the reader, the true state of the case. From C to M is the present line from the Chepuitnick to Mars Hill; from C to H is that proposed by the American Government, and which would probably strike the highlands represented by H to the Eastward of a point Northwardly of the source of the St. Croix, — the Americans gaining at least the area between C H M; and which would belong to Great Britain, were the line run as directed by the treaty of 1783, due north from S the source of the St. Croix to H at the Highlands, shown by the dotted line.



That is the just and true line between the two countries, and Great Britain can assent to no other without compromising the honour of the crown, the integrity of the empire, and ultimately jeopardising the security of these Provinces.

An Inquest was held yesterday morning before Henry Fisher, Jur. Esq. on view of the body of William Humphries found in the River, opposite the Barracks. Verdict, "Accidental death by drowning." This man had been drinking till a late hour in the night, and attempting to cross the river in a state of intoxication he overturned the canoe; and altho' so near the shore that his associates could hear the water gurgling in his throat while drowning, yet they were unable to render him any assistance.
