

Sir,—your declared intention to suppress the discussion which I had just commenced in your paper, appears to be at variance with the conditions of your prospectus; and on further consideration I trust you will be induced to change your mind.

The bill for the better observance of the Lord's Day was, during the last Session of the Legislature, passed unanimously by the House of Assembly, but not concurred in by the Legislative Council. It is therefore one of those very subjects upon which the public have a right to receive information, through the columns of the Sentinel; it being one of the avowed objects for which that paper was established, to admit a free and fair investigation of all Legislative proceedings.

When the said Bill was before the House, it appeared in debate, that although the members were unanimous in passing it, yet they differed in their views with regard to the nature of the obligation to observe the day, and also with regard to the extent of such observance. Upon this the Rev. Mr. Birkmyre by public advertisement, and also by several announcements from the pulpit, gave notice that he should deliver a public discourse on the subject; which he accordingly did to a very large assembly. In this discourse he particularly alluded to the proceedings of the Legislature, and was somewhat severe on a member of the House of Commons, whose views had been quoted in debate. This discourse has since been published, and in pamphlet form is now fully before the people of this Province.

While these proceedings were in progress, I wrote two articles, especially called for by a writer in the "Chronicle"; but unfortunately, although my sentiments agree with many eminent members of the House of Commons, who voted in the majority on the rejection of Sir Andrew Agnew's Bill, they do not happen to coincide with those of Mr. Birkmyre. As he however had urged all that eloquence and zeal could furnish on the one side of this important question, I did hope, and still do hope, to be allowed, briefly, to lay before your readers, the opinions of Messrs. Potter, Poulter, Roebuck, Gisborne, Evans, Phillips, O'Connell, Lord Morpeth, Sir E. L. Bulwer, Sir R. Ferguson, Sir M. W. Rieley and others in the House of Commons, and perhaps those of Martin Luther, Paley, Blair and some other eminent Divines. The truth is, that "nothing is gained by concealment," as is applicable to this, as to any other Legislative question. Every matter publicly brought forward, for the purpose of being made part and parcel of the Law of the land, to which all the people are bound to yield obedience, is not only entitled to free discussion in the Halls of Legislation, but also to a full and fair investigation in the public Journals of the country.

I agree with the Rev. Mr. Birkmyre, that a common secular Newspaper is not a proper place wherein to carry on a theological discussion; but surely that Rev. Gentleman's objection ought not to apply to the merits of any Bill, publicly brought forward as a Legislative enactment; nor ought it to be refused the courtesy of a reply to his communication, the more especially as I never engaged with him as an opponent, and in consideration also of his views, couched in the most eloquent and energetic language, being already so fully before the country.

I hope therefore, Mr. Ward, that you will not refuse this hurried note a place in your paper; and that you will, after all, allow me to continue the discussion.

We have made copious extracts from London papers by the Great Western, which are to the 15th April. It will be seen that the attempt to pass another resolution expressive of want of confidence in Her Majesty's present advisers, had been lost; the majority, including the absentees on both sides, being 21.

The Bill recently passed for disposing of the clergy reserves in Upper Canada, will not, it is probable, receive the royal assent, the Colonial Legislature having exceeded its powers. This must be a cause of regret, to those who hoped that the measure would be productive of the settlement of a vexatious question. But as no such effect would probably have resulted, the expectation may now be indulged, that a decision will ultimately be arrived at, more consonant with the enlightened spirit of the age, and the wishes of a vast majority of the inhabitants of these Provinces.

OROMOTO.—We were at the mouth of the Oromoto River during the present week; and are glad to find the bridge across that stream rapidly advancing towards completion, the last pile having been driven on Tuesday. It is proposed to extend a causeway across the interval on this side the river, tenders for which are advertised in this day's Sentinel.

The scenery about the mouth of the Oromoto is of the most delightful kind; and it has long been a source of regret that there has not been a comfortable house of entertainment, for travellers or persons desirous of partaking of a day's recreation;—the distance from Fredericton being only twelve miles.

We are much gratified therefore in being able to state, that in addition to an hotel which will probably be erected, the public can be entertained at the house of Mr. George Nevers, in the most comfortable manner. Those who may be disposed to avail themselves of a little rural enjoyment, can either drive down in their carriages, or take the morning's steam boat, which will land them at the Oromoto at half-past eight, in time for breakfast; they may take an early dinner, and leave there at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and be home by half-past six;—in time for tea.

We are authorised to state, that Mrs. Nevers is prepared to receive company; the house is well furnished, the grounds about it and the views are delightful; and we trust she will meet with sufficient public patronage, to induce her to continue her exertions in their behalf.

LIBERTY OF THE PRESS.—There seems to be no subject, about which greater misapprehension prevails, than the above; and some publishers of papers in this and the neighboring Province seem very generally to imagine, that it embraces the right of attacking private character, and assailing individuals of whatever standing, with the grossest misrepresentation and personal scurrility.

In the discharge of that duty, which every Journalist owes the public, we some time since cautioned them against a person, who was then passing thro' these Provinces, deceiving and swindling their inhabitants; who in return inserted a false and malignant libel against us, in the Acadia Recorder, published at Halifax; the Printers of which Journal, have recently been cast in an action, which we brought against them in consequence of that publication; and a Special Jury have given a verdict of £40,—which with costs of suit, will inflict upon them a penalty of probably one Hundred Pounds.

In bringing that action, our object was not

the obtaining any pecuniary advantage; and at a very early stage of the proceeding, we requested the gentleman who acted as our counsel, to meet any tender of accommodation with a proposal, that the publishers of the Recorder should publicly apologise for their conduct, and pay about the same amount which the Jury have since assessed, to the charitable institutions of the place. This however was not done, the action proceeded, and the court and jury have performed their duty.

We shall publish the trial in our next, as it will have appeared in the Nova Scotian of Thursday; and should have felt it unnecessary to make any remark, were it not that the printers of the Recorder and others of similar principle, are endeavoring to create an impression, that the liberty and proper freedom of the Press has been assailed; which is not the case.

Since the proceedings of the Legislature in the case of the Chronicle libel was commenced, we have heard a deal of wincing and whining upon that score; and cannot wonder if the parties implicated, do not feel quite as secure as before, now that a Jury in Nova Scotia have faithfully performed their duty. It were time that some measures were adopted to check a vulgar and growing evil; and we know of no better plan than appealing to the laws of the country, whenever public or private character is wantonly or vindictively assailed.

The steam packets that are to ply between England and Nova Scotia are to commence running on the 15th June, and Mr. CUNARD anticipates that they will make the passage in 10 days, and in 36 hours from Boston to Halifax.

Bangor, May 11.

The Augusta Age of last week stated that it learnt from "correct sources" that the "U. S. troops, heretofore understood to have been ordered to Houlton, are in fact ordered to the Disputed Territory," and added that "this movement was just to Maine."

Can the Age inform us whether the order is to be carried into execution, or whether it has been countermanded? And if countermanded whether "such a movement" is just to Maine?

The brewers of Albany commenced a suit several years since against E. C. Delavan for several articles published in the Temperance Recorder, which stated that the ingredients used in the manufacture of beer were so offensive, that the article was not a fit drink for any decent being. The trial took place at Albany last week. The cause turned on the truth of an article published by the defendant in February 1835, charging the plaintiff and others with the use, for several years, of filthy and impure water in malting. And the jury returned a verdict for the defendant with costs.
