

On a concerted signal, Sergeant Brees (who was not dressed in Military uniform) was escorted up to Lieut. Col. Maxwell by the Sergeant Major and six of the oldest Sergeants present, the band playing the Regimental quick step.

Upon their halting the Lieut. Col. read aloud in a distinct voice a record of the services of Sergeant Brees, who had served with the corps in different quarters of the globe for twenty-three years, with honor and credit, and he then dismounted from his horse to complete the ceremony by attaching the honorable badge to his breast; the moment he did so the Regiment presented arms by order of Major Cairnes, its oldest officer, the band playing the National Anthem. The Lieut. Col. then addressed the Regiment as follows, in an audible voice:—

35th Regiment! you have just witnessed the most gratifying ceremony of beholding an old Soldier rewarded, in presence of his comrades, for good and faithful services. How delightful this part of a commanding officer's duty is; and I only hope, I may live long enough in command of you to have again to repeat this pleasing task to many others I now see around me. How different this is from the obligation equally binding on me, as your Commanding Officer, to punish crime, (here the Colonel getting much excited exclaimed) but I thank my God, and I feel pride and exultation in declaring, that crime does not exist in this Regiment, nor in this Garrison. (Here he turned towards the Artillery and continued.)—For although I have been for a long period its Commandant; there never has been a Non-Commissioned Officer, nor Soldier, of the gallant corps now standing on our right, ever before me, this says much for its immediate Commanding Officer, to whom I return my best thanks, and whom I regret to think we are about so soon to lose. Let me however rejoice, that he and his Gallant Corps were present to witness and assist at this ceremony, for I must ever feel a deep and lively interest in Her Majesty's Royal Artillery, having had the honor of serving in it for nearly five and twenty years! (The gallant Colonel again turned to his Regiment, and to his Recruits, and said.) This announcement in itself makes me out a pretty old Soldier, therefore I expect the young will listen to me with respect and attention; and alas! most that now stand around me are comparatively young, for our long period of service in a pestilential climate, where death and disease made sad havoc amongst us, thinned our ranks of most of our old Soldiers. I therefore now call upon the young ones and advise them to attend to their respective duties to be subordinate and respectful to their superiors, and to avoid by every means in their power, that besetting sin, that great stumbling block of the British Army, Drink! so that you may retire from the service with the sweet consolation of having done their duty to their Sovereign and to their Country, and meet with a similar reward to that, just bestowed on now Town Sergeant JOHN BREESE.

During this moving harangue, a few eyes were filled with tears; and we have no doubt the scene will leave a lasting impression upon the minds of every man present.

In the evening the Sergeants of the Regiment gave an entertainment in honor of Sergeant BREESE, to which the Non-Commissioned Officers of the Royal Artillery were invited, and where there was no end to toasting and speechifying.—*Gazette.*
