

It will be perceived that advices from England are five or six days later; but are destitute of interest. The Governor General of India, it appears has not declared war against the Chinese, altho' he had made every preparation for such an event, and only awaited instructions and reinforcements from England.

The Great Western steamer, was to leave Bristol on the 15th April, and probably will have arrived at New York by this time. It is expected that she will bring out the ultimatum of the British Government with reference to the Boundary question. The prevailing opinion in the United States is, that there will be another arbitration, and that the two General Governments will be left to agree upon the terms.—The probability however is, that having ascertained the true state of the question, the British government will not allow of such arbitration, especially if the decision of the King of Holland is to form the basis.

It is rumored that three additional regiments have been ordered to this Province,—two from England, and one from the West Indies.

The monument which had been erected over the remains of the gallant General Brock on the heights at Queenstown, has been wantonly and sacrilegiously destroyed; having been blown up by some of those scoundrels, who still hover about the Upper Canada border.

A most disastrous fire has occurred at Kingston Upper Canada, by which seventy-five houses, including the principal places of business have been destroyed, besides an immense amount of property, including about 16,000 barrels of flour.

It will be seen by advertisements in another column, that the York Horticultural Society have had a meeting, and awarded prizes for certain objects; and that a supply of Shrubs and Trees having arrived from the United States, they will be ready for delivery on Monday next.

Dr. Woodford who left this place express for Washington last week, passed through Boston on his way thither on Friday se'night. We understand that a messenger arrived from the United States on Monday last, with despatches for the Lieut. Governor.

In the notice of the Meeting at St. Mary's church which appeared in our last, we omitted to mention that it is in the Parish of Douglas. We understand that the inhabitants there are willing to pay £80 annually for a clergyman resident near the Kiswick, which with the £100 which the Society will give, ought to ensure for them the offices of a pious and talented divine, and for himself with other emoluments, a comfortable and respectable living.

The want of a room where Society meetings could be held, and where clergymen of other denominations besides those of the town could address a congregation which might assemble, and for other public purposes, has long been wanted in this place; and we are glad to perceive that an ample and spacious room will be reserved for that purpose, in Messrs. Beckwith's large building at the upper end of the town.

From the Buffalo Journal of April 18. A postscript to the Toronto Patriot of Tuesday last, has the following: We stop the press to say that we have just heard, from an authority which may be relied on, that His Excellency, the Lieutenant Governor, has received important despatches from Major General Sir Richard D. Jackson, in reference, it is supposed, to the North Eastern Boundary question. Indications of activity in our military defences have been manifested. Our authorities are on the alert, and serious difficulties must therefore be apprehended.

The leading article of the Patriot strongly urges the probability of a war between Great Britain and the United States, on the ground that the former country cannot give up the disputed territory, without at the same relinquishing the Canadas, and concludes with the following advice: "Our parting words to our loyal fellow subjects, are, keep your muskets clean, look to your flints, and above all, keep your powder dry, for a contest with the United States can not be a small war."

The Toronto Colonist of Wednesday says, an order has been issued by the Commander of the Forces, intimating that none of the officers stationed in the provinces, can for the present be allowed leave of absence from their regiments. The same paper says, the despatches above referred to by the Patriot, are said to be of an important character, but their precise nature has not transpired.

AFFAIRS OF NOVA SCOTIA.

The political questions that are at present occupying the attention of our fellow subjects in Nova Scotia, are of such vital importance to all the Colonies in this hemisphere, that we feel it unnecessary to make any apology for devoting a portion of the Sentinel from time to time to the proceedings in that Province.

In our last we copied an account of the meeting which recently took place at Yarmouth; and in the present number will be found the speech of Mr. HUNTINGTON on that occasion. It is a plain unvarnished document, and contains a candid recital of the affairs of that Province, and the causes that have produced them. We observe meetings have been held in other parts of the County, to which we will just advert, in order that our readers may properly understand the occurrences that have taken place, and that they may rightly appreciate them.

We mentioned in our last, that the meetings at Halifax had been followed by others at Annapolis and Bridgetown, two places about 12 miles apart, where several half-pay officers and officials reside, and where resolutions in favor of Sir Colin Campbell were passed; while at Wilton the next Parish in the same county, where no such influence exists, and where the feelings of the people generally would probably be more correctly expressed, the decision was quite the reverse. The meeting at Yarmouth will also express the sentiments of the inhabitants of the County of Shelburne very generally.

There had also been a meeting at Liverpool, the shire-town of the County of that name, which lies on the Atlantic sea-board, back of Annapolis, and adjoining the County of Shelburne, where resolutions had also passed adverse to the Assembly; but which we are convinced will not be in accordance with popular feeling throughout the County, where there are numerous and populous settlements. At Lunenburg the shire-town of the County, which lies between Liverpool and Halifax, just such resolutions have been passed as might be expected from its representatives, who are all determined Tories. The people of this County are many of them, ignorant Germans—generally Lutherans and Episcopalians,—with a sprinkling of Presbyterians and Wesleyan Methodists. At Chester however, there is a large Baptist Church; and that denomination is numerous in

other parts of the County. It is not probable however, that there will be any other demonstration in that quarter; and the same members may be returned for the next Assembly. The Eastern part of the County of Halifax, is composed of three extensive settlements, called Lower, Middle and Upper Musquodobit, the inhabitants of which are generally speaking, wealthy and intelligent agriculturists. There have also been two meetings in that quarter,—the one called by Major GLADWIN, an officer on half pay, and who was the last unsuccessful candidate, and others of his party: who of course passed resolutions disapproving of the proceedings of the Assembly; but another of a more general nature, which was held at Middle Musquodobit, decided unanimously in favor of that body; their interest will render secure the seats of Messrs. Howe and Anand, who now represent the county of Halifax.

A meeting was got up by the governor's party at Amherst, where there seems to have been a drawn battle; the opposing party withdrawing, and leaving the other, which it would seem was the minority, to pass what resolutions they pleased. In Horton, where Mr. Dewolf resides, who is one of the members for the county, and an Executive Councillor, a similar meeting had been called; but the majority was too powerful; and resolutions were passed, approving of the proceedings of the House of Assembly.

These are all the meetings which have taken place, as far as we can recollect. At Pictou, an Address to His Excellency had been numerously signed by the Kirk party; but the anti-Burghers, who are equally numerous, appear to have stood aloof. The members from that county are both high tory, and they presented the address previous to the adjournment of the Legislature. The state of parties in that unfortunate county, will prevent more than about a moiety of its inhabitants from agreeing to any measure; and hence no address from the opposite party will be presented to Sir Colin.

From what has taken place, the opinion we have hitherto entertained is confirmed, that where official or high-church influence can be brought to bear successfully, the expression of feeling will be in favor of the course pursued by Sir Colin Campbell; but wherever the voice of the people prevails, the decision will be highly gratifying to their representatives, and approbatory of the conduct of the majority.

And however we may regret the result, and viewing the whole transaction without the slightest tincture of party feeling, we cannot see how the Assembly could have acted otherwise than they have done. The Lieut. Governor has not only disregarded the instructions and despatches which were transmitted by the Colonial Secretary, but has acted in direct opposition to their spirit and tenor.

We observe that St. George's Day was kept in St. John in the usual manner. The only notice of the venerable gentleman which we heard of in this quarter, is contained in the following obituary item, which we received last Saturday too late for publication:

OBITUARY. Died at Fredericton on the 23d inst. at half past 6 P. M. our beloved Tutelar Saint George. His case was for the three previous days doubtful,—his disease—was when too late, discovered to be a vacuum in the stomach. It is to be lamented that, so many of his countrymen being in medical practice, the Sovereign remedy had not been presented.—Beef and Pudding.

The Duke of Wellington has been advised by his physicians, to retire from public life after the close of the present session of Parliament.—A report prevails that the King of Hanover is dead. At the date of the last advices he was seriously indisposed.
