

this Province on the subject, particularly as such measures would tend to increase their illicit introduction to a most alarming degree; would have a most baneful influence in demoralizing the habits of the people, and would impose extraordinary burthens upon the Province, by the enormous amount of money necessary to attempt the enforcement of any Law which might contain such prohibitions, without being attended with the consequences contemplated and intended by such enactment.

While upon this subject it may not be amiss to state, that in Quebec the Magistrates in Session have decided, that it is inexpedient and unnecessary to grant a tavern licence to any Grocer, Pastry Cook, or persons retailing spirituous or fermented liquors; of 241 applications 69 were refused,—reducing the number granted to 172. Last year the number of applicants was 326, of which 298 were sanctioned by the Special Sessions, and 201 were ultimately approved of by the Governor in Chief, whose sanction and approval must be obtained before any licence can issue.

In the hurry of publication, a wrong Resolution moved by Mr Woodward, was introduced into the debate reported in last Wednesday's supplement, which as it had reference to the same subject, passed unobserved at the time. The following is the Resolution which should have appeared; and it will be seen that the object of Mr Woodward's motion, was to raise a Committee to report on the salaries borne on the Civil List, with a view to fixing salaries prospectively, with regard to the future incumbents.

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the Salaries that are to be borne on the Civil List—and that they be empowered to call on the incumbents of any Office for information and return of the incomes either by Fees, Salaries, or otherwise, received at any Office or Offices in the Province—with a view of fixing the income and salaries of any Officer or Officers within the Province, at such rates as will secure attention, ability and integrity in the discharge of the duties of the several Offices; as in the opinion of this House, incomes and salaries from any public Office more than sufficient to secure a due performance of the duties, are injurious to the public service, and often detrimental to the incumbent; and also to ascertain what Offices may be consolidated, or what abolished or dispensed with, (if any,) and report thereon.

Messrs. Woodward, Fisher and Hill were the Committee appointed for that purpose.

The Bill for regulating the mode of selecting Jurors was again taken up yesterday, and ultimately passed, after much discussion with reference to its details, with a clause exempting the City and County of St. John from its operation.

A Bill for assessing the Parish of St. Stephens, passed the House yesterday, authorising an assessment for £100 to erect an engine house. A Bill to incorporate the Pew-holders of St. Luke's Church also had its third reading.

We have been favoured with a statement of duties collected at St. Andrews last year, the new vessels registered, and those built for owners in the United Kingdom, the entrances and clearances, and the amount of foreign Molasses and Sugar imported during the same period. The amount of tonnage at present registered at that port, we understand to be 17,000 tons.

We have inserted in our last and the present number, the opening address, extracted from Dr. GESSNER's second Geological Report; and regret that we have not space to spare during the sitting of the Legislature, for continuing to insert it, as was our intention.—It is a valuable document; and reveals much of the mineral wealth of the country. We are happy to find that several persons residing in the Province, are desirous of availing themselves of the natural advantages which the County of Westmorland in particular possesses.

On our last page will be found an account of what has recently taken place in Nova Scotia, under the working of the responsible system. It will be seen that Sir Colin Campbell, as his namesake did here, has thought proper to place himself in opposition to the determination of the government at home, as well as the wishes of the people abroad. We have been of opinion for some time, that His Excellency would mar any measure of reform that might be entrusted to his execution; but were not quite prepared for so disrespectful an act.

NOVA SCOTIA HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.—Notwithstanding the Resolutions which passed last week, and which as we thought, laid the first stone of the New Constitution, we almost begin to doubt whether they will be carried into full operation. The Lieutenant Governor has positively refused to accede to the wishes of the House, as will be perceived by reference to his Answer, in another part of our paper. The reply, undoubtedly was a subject of much mortification to the Assembly, as they concluded upon a very different reception. It was at first contemplated to apply to the Governor General of the Colonies, but after the feverish agitation of the moment was over, the House resolved not to adopt that course, save as a *demerit resort*. The discussion on the subject will shew, that they ascribed the whole blame to the Executive Council, and not to His Excellency. They paused before casting so serious a reflection upon the character of the "noble old soldier" previous to taking every constitutional means of obtaining their object. With this view, a fresh address has been

prepared, in which the wishes and interests of the people are so clearly defined, that His Excellency must indeed be regardless of the voice of prudence, if he should neglect this last opportunity of conciliation.

It is a very dangerous move to slight the friendly overtures of a party, whom nothing upon earth could have induced to make, save the certainty of their being received. Should, however, the Governor, under the spell of some fatal delusion, or hurried on by an ignis fatuus of which he is at present insensible, decline the hand of welcome that is extended to him, he may find himself in the very unpleasant position of an elderly maiden lady dealing with a Jew, who having beaten her down to the last penny, takes her departure, declaring that she does not want the article—and in five minutes is seen with humility returning to take the goods at what she had previously bid for them. We have it from pretty good authority, that this will be the last important act which His Excellency will in all likelihood be called upon to perform in Nova Scotia, so that he will perhaps have some little regard to the name which he will leave behind him. Since our Editorial of last week the Hon. J. B. Uniacke has resigned his seat in the Executive Council.—Halifax Recorder, Saturday last.

One Day later from England.—The packet ship Philadelphia, at New York from London, brings papers of that city to the 27th, and Portsmouth to the 28th Dec.

The committees of the Belfast public bakery lately addressed a memorial to the Lords of the Treasury, praying that they might be permitted to import foreign flour into Ireland; as the people of England may do in England.

There had been more severe fighting in Algiers between the French troops and the natives. The French were successful. About 200 of the French army were on the sick list.

Our European intelligence is only a shade later, as they say in the mercantile world. The news from India is highly interesting, and will be found in a preceding column.
