

Canadian People Opposed To Plan For St. Lawrence

Quebec Is Not Favorable To Making River Great Seaway.

There is so much propaganda favorable to the St. Lawrence seaway plan being put out by interested organizations that the impression gained by many people that this is a project which has the general backing of the Canadian people. Such is not the case.

A careful reading of editorial comment and letters received from representative citizens in all parts of Canada, indicates the situation so far as public support is concerned to be about as follows:

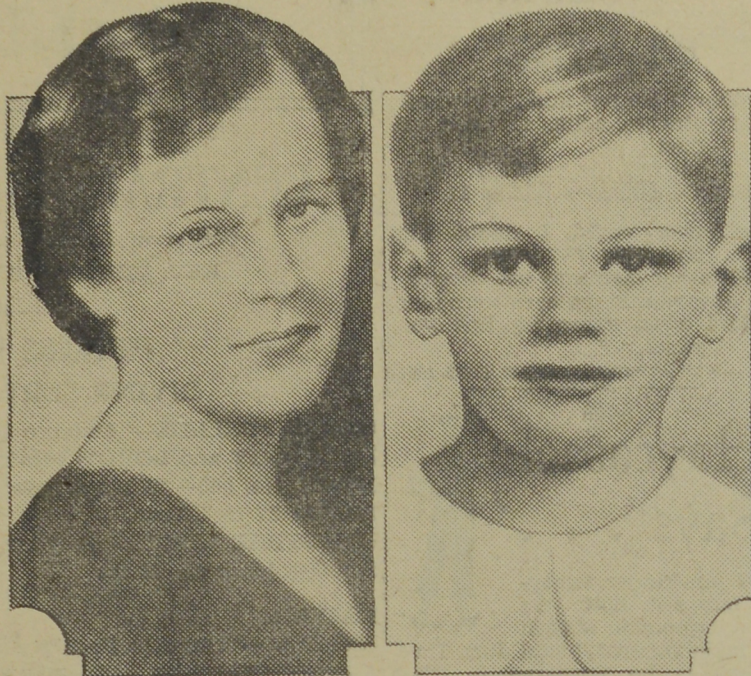
Nova Scotia is definitely opposed to making any contribution by way of taxation to the seaway. New Brunswick feels equally keenly on the same point and Prince Edward Island is also in agreement. Quebec province is very largely opposed to the seaway because it cannot see the economic advantage of moving the head of navigation further inland.

Starting at the other end of the country we find British Columbia completely opposed and Alberta indifferent since the seaway offers them no advantages whatsoever in cheaper transportation for their products.

Saskatchewan is split on the matter but Manitoba is, generally speaking, favorable. But in this connection it should not be forgotten that Saskatchewan and Manitoba were given the Hudson Bay Railway and the new port at Churchill to give them their cheap route to Europe and if the

NO GASOLINE COMMISSION CONTEMPLATED IN QUEBEC

That covetous eyes should not be cast by governments upon the gasoline business, just because that business happens to be profitable, is the official attitude of the Provincial Government of Quebec. There is no likelihood of any government gasoline commission being formed to market motor fuel, because Quebec feels that \$5,000,000 in taxes derived last year from gas tax is all that should reasonably be expected of the motorist. Besides that, the Government does not think it would make a success of gasoline-selling even if it tried the plan, as suggested by one of the Legislature members. So there will be no Quebec Government control of Gasoline and other provinces will hesitate to consider such an idea in the light of Premier Taschereau's statement that a constitutional issue is involved.
