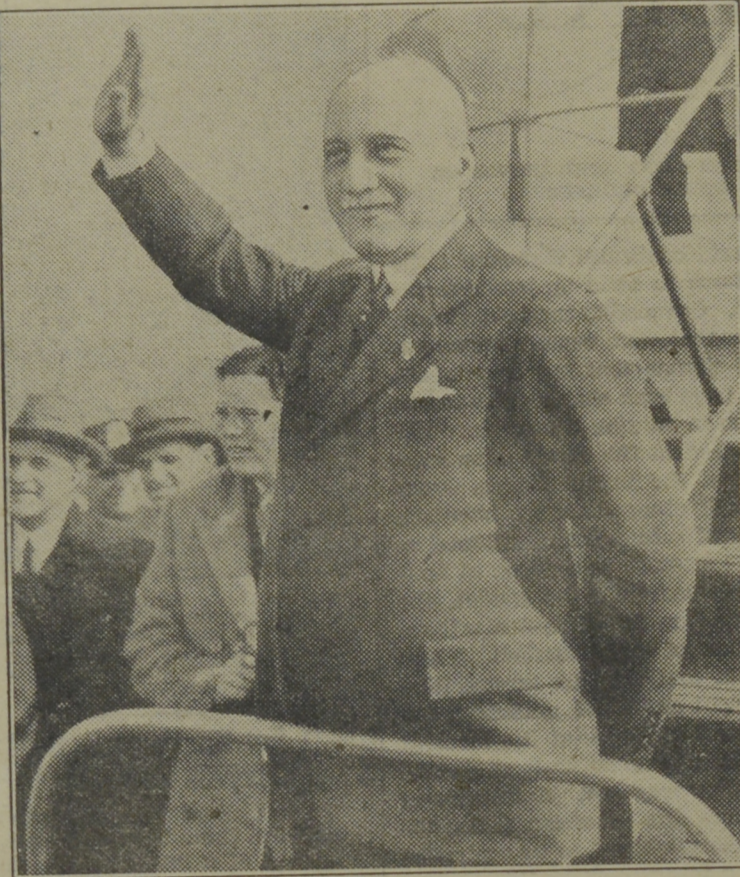
Toronto Prospector-Aviator Describes Condition in Arctic Circle.

Wood is almost worth its weight in gold to the hardy Eskimos struggling for existence along the east shore of Hudson Bay. Bob Cockeram, Toronto prospector-aviator, spent the summer in an aerial exploration of the bleak coast of Hudson Bay and the rocky interior of the Ungava peninsula. As he flew north in his small seaplane accompanied by a larger aircraft carrying supplies, practically all vestiges of timber growth disappeared, according to a description of the flight published in Canadian Aviation.

About Port Harrison, 140 miles south of Povungnituk, there was hardly even a stunted willow bush to be seen. Hudson Bay waves lapped against a land of bare rock covered in patches with moss and lichens.

The Eskimos have to do the best they can without wood. Mr. Cockeram had the foresight to lash a bundle of saplings to the undercarriage of his seaplane before he quit James Bay and these had to serve as tent poles. All cooking had to be done on a primus stove. The Eskimos were delighted with the white men's gift of a few matches.

The city of Sydney, N.S., has decided to cut ten per cent from the salaries of all officials, with the exception of the chief of police, whose salary was cut last year. The tax rate will remain at last year's figure, 4.59.

The \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who set fire to Mount Allison University buildings this spring, has been increased to \$1,000 by the university officials.

Hubert MacDonald, 26, a native of Prince Edward Island, was accidentally killed last Saturday at the Dorchester Penitentiary, when he fell from the roof of a new boiler on which he was working to the top of a coal bunker. Death was instantaneous.

Stocks of Prince Edward Island potatoes are on the move, according to reports. Only about 600,000 bushels are now obtainable for buyers, and they are being rapidly depleted, giving rise to much optimism among growers for the coming season.

Six-year-old Douglas MacDonald, of Truro, was found dead last week in the ashpit of the railway yard at Truro. He had been missing since the night before, and large numbers of people had been

searching for him without result. The body was found by a workman.

A resolution sponsored by the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association, calling for application of the second test for bovine tuberculosis on the mainland of Nova Scotia has been endorsed by the Legislature's Agricultural Committee. The initial test on Cape Breton Island will not take place till a thorough canvass of the farmers has been taken.
