

STAMP COLLECTING

UNITED STATES

Those collectors who are interested in stamps of the United States will need to be on the watch for the two commemorative stamps to be issued on June 1 in connection with the Chicago Progress Exposition, which will be opened at that time.

There will be a 1c. and a 3c. stamp, but the designs have not yet been definitely announced. This information will probably be forthcoming before the end of May.

PERSONAL PORTRAIT STAMPS

While the idea is not entirely new, it has apparently remained for a young woman living in Montmartre to invent a machine that will produce personal portraits in the form of postage stamps.

The stamps are produced in sheets, perforated the same as regular stamps. The idea, of course, is that anyone may buy stamps bearing their own portrait and attach them to correspondence or use them in any way they wish.

Montmartre, where the inventor lives, lies just to the north of Paris on a hill rising to the summit, crowned by the basilica of the Sacre Coeur, begun in 1875. The district is thickly populated and of recent years have been noted mostly for its night life reports.

MOUNTAIN STAMPS

The recent publicity given to the British flying explorers, P. F. Fellowes and Lord Clydesdale, who have soared over Mount Everest, the world's highest peak, has made us mountain-minded—so how about a collection of Mountain Stamps. A glance through your catalogue will show that mountains are depicted on many stamps and as none of these are rare they are within reach of every collector.

The first mountain stamp one will come across in British colonial stamps is Mount Roraima, depicted on the 1c. stamp of the Jubilee issue of British Guiana. This sandstone mountain is situated where Brazil, Venezuela and British Guiana meet, and is about 6,500 feet high.

The Roey Mountains appear on the \$1 stamp of the 1930 issue of Canada and on various stamps of the United States, notably the 5c. of the 1898 issue, which shows John C. Fremont, an American explorer in the Rockies. Mount Ararat, around which are gathered many traditions concerning the Deluge is pictured on stamps both of trans-Caucasia and Armenia. It is not surprising that it is the legendary resting place of Noah's Ark, as it is some 17,000 feet above the sea.

Turning to New Zealand we find several pictures of Mounts Earnslaw, Ruapehu and Cook. The

5s. stamp of 1898 gives one of the finest representation of a mountain to be found on any British colony stamp, Mount Cook, which this stamp depicts, is situated in the South Island, 12,000 feet in height, its summit was first gained on Christmas Day, 1894. In 1908 Ecuador issued a series of stamps commemorating the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Quito Railway. The highest value appropriately bears a fine picture of Mount Chimborazo, a peak of the Andes, which is some 20,000 feet above the sea level; and it is interesting to note that the railway crossing these mountains is the highest in the world.

The stamps of many other countries portray mountains, and it would be impossible to discuss them all. Mountain-loving stamp collectors who are interested can look into the history of these themselves.

CANADIAN COMMEMORATIVE

On May 18, there will be placed on sale a 5c. pictorial stamp commemorating the meeting of the world's postal executives at Ottawa in May and June. When notice was first received that this stamp would be issued on May 18, we thought possibly there might be some connection between the stamp and our Loyalist celebration, but it now turns out that there is no connection whatever and that the postal authorities gave no consideration to a Loyalist stamp.

The stamp is 1 13-16 by 1 1/4 inches in dimensions, and is printed in blue ink. At each top corner a large white numeral "5" appears in a panel, with the word "cents" immediately below in small letters. The word "Canada" also appears in a half-circle in the upper portion of the stamp. Within an inner frame-work, rectangular at the bottom and semi-circular at the top, is a view of the sky-line of Ottawa, featuring Parliament Hill as it appears from the Ottawa River. Underneath are the words "Postal Union Postale, Ottawa, 1933." On each side of the view, under the values, are sprays of maple leaves.

British North America Act

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ment assembled, and by the Authority of the same as follows:

I.—Preliminary

1. This Act may be cited as the British North America Act, 1867.
2. The Provisions of this Act referring to Her Majesty the Queen extend also to the Heirs and Successors of Her Majesty, Kings and Queens of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

II.—Union

3. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, to declare by Proclamation that, on and after a Day therein appointed, not being more than six months after the passing

of this Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick shall form and be One Dominion under the Name of Canada; and on and after that Day those Three Provinces shall form and be One Dominion under that Name accordingly.

4. The subsequent Provisions of this Act shall, unless it is otherwise expressed or implied, commence and have effect on and after the Union, that is to say, on and after the Day appointed for the Union taking effect in the Queen's Proclamation; and in the same Provisions, unless it is otherwise expressed or implied, the Name Canada shall be taken to mean Canada as constituted under this Act.

5. Canada shall be divided into Four Provinces, named Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

ference, with a view to the perpetuation of the connection with the Mother Country, and the promotion of the best interests of the people of these provinces, desire to follow the model of the British Constitution so far as circumstances will permit

4. The Executive Authority or Government shall be vested in the Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and be administered according to the well understood principles of the British Constitution by the Sovereign personally, or by the representative of the Sovereign duly authorized.

5. The Sovereign shall be commander-in-chief of the Land and Naval Militia Forces.

6. There shall be a General Legislature or Parliament for the Confederation, composed of the Sovereign, a Legislative Council and a House of Commons.

7. For the purpose of forming the Legislative Council the Confederation shall be considered as consisting of three divisions: First, Upper Canada; second, Lower Canada, and third, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; each division with an equal representation in the Legislative Council.

8. Upper Canada shall be represented in the Legislative Council by 24 members, Lower Canada by 24 members, and the Maritime Provinces by 24 members, of which Nova Scotia shall have 12 and New Brunswick 12 members

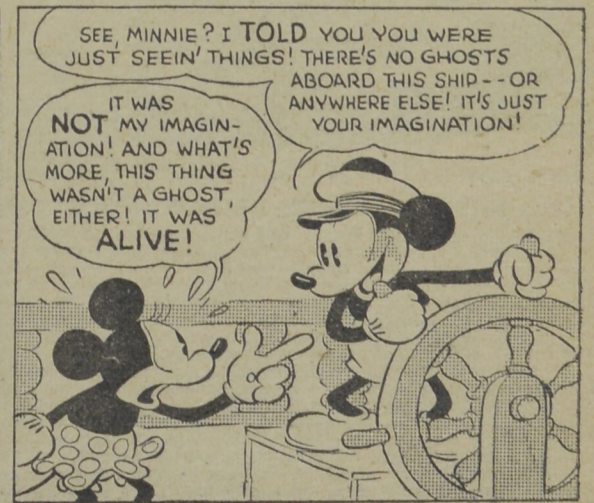
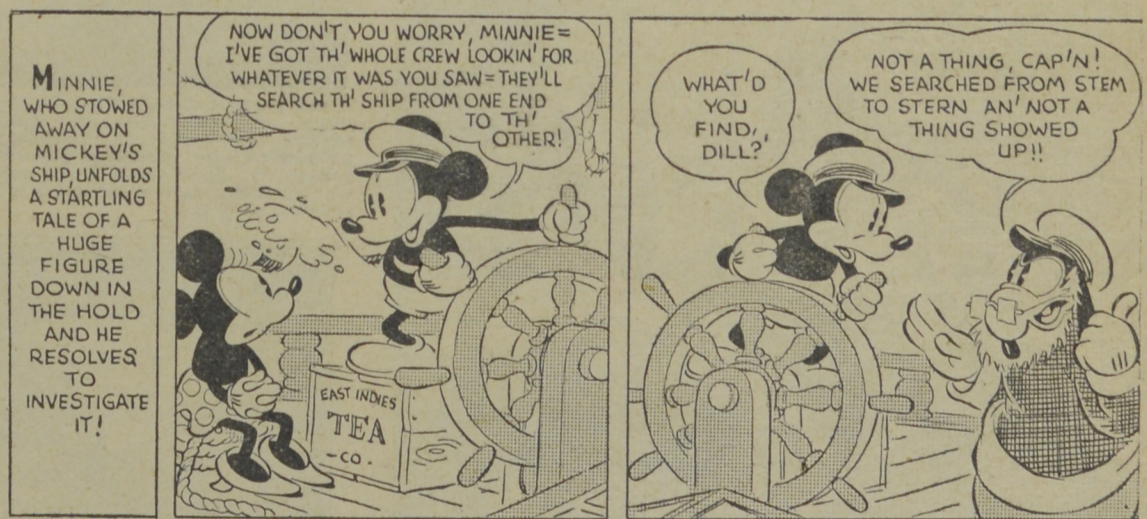
